Boston, October 6. Captain Pratt, who arrived last night, in 38 days from Amsterdam, informs, that Copenhagen was furrendered to the British on the 20th of August, without relistance. When it appears in the course of the lawfuit that the lender habitually demands usurious interest, the tribunal before which it is pleaded may condemn the lender to a fine which cannot exceed the half of the capital of the fums fued for.

If in the transaction there should appear to have been any fwindling, the accused shall be turned over to the correctional police, and the punishment shall be, befides the aforesaid fine, an imprisonment which cannot exceed two years.

PITTSBURG, September 29.

Early last week Mr. William B. Irish, deputy marshal, left this place for Beaver county, to execute feveral writs of Habere Facias Possessionem, iffued out of the circuit court of the United States for the district of Pennsylvania, for lands recovered by the Population company against various fettlers in that county. On Wednesday the 23d inft. Mr. Irish was proceeding to the house of William Foulkes one of the perfons against whom judgment had been obtained in faid court, in company with Enion William, agent for the company, George Holdship, Esq. and James Hamilton; when having just entered the lane leading to Foulke's House, three or four gume were fired from a thicket of bullies close by the road fide, and two balls struck Mr. Hamilton, who fell from his horse, and expired in a few minutes-the others made their escape immediately through the woods to Greensburgh. Mr. Hamilton had that morning been put in possession of a tract of land held by contract with the company, about two miles from the place where the horrid deed was perpetrated, and no doubt but the villains knew him well when they fired at him. Some neighbours collected in the attermoon to remove the body of Mr. Hamilton; Mr. Foulkes, it is faid, came to them, and expressed great forrow at the unfortunare accident, although he had threatened a day or two before, that if the marshal would come to disposses him, blood would be spilt on the occasion.

Mr. Irish came that evening to Beaver to get the theriff of the county, who is also colonel of a regiment of militia, to call out a party to go in purfuit of the murderers; and only about fifteen could be collected who were willing to go, as it was believed the party was forty or fifty strong, and that they were refolutely determined that they would not let themselves be taken.

This appears to be the first blood that has been flied in pursuance of the long and doubtful contest between the warrant holders and actual fettlers, for lands north of the rivers Ohio and Allegany; altho' individuals had often went amongst the settlers, encouraging them to hold out against the company, and to oppole the execution of the laws after the company having gained the land from time to time in the circuit court; although publications had been repeatedly made in news-papers nearly to the fame tenor; vet it is believed that there never was an individual circulated or published so base and infamous a piece, as that which appeared in the Commonwealth last Wednesday, headed "ACTUAL SETTLERS," written no doubt by a person whose particular duty it is to promote obedience to the laws, rather than to encourage their open violation.
