CONGRESS.

IN SENATE, Thursday, November 5, 1807. The following refolution was laid on the table of the Senate

by Mr. Tiffin.

ESOLVED, by the fenate and house of reprefentatives of the United States of America, in

ongress affembled, two thirds of both houses concoming, that the following fection be submitted to the legislatures of the feveral flates, which, when ratihed and confirmed by the legislatures of three fourths of the faid states, shall be valid and binding as a part of the constitution of the United States, in lieu of the first section of the third article thereof.
The judicial power of the United States shall be

sefted in one supreme court; and in such inferior courts as the congress may from time to time ordain and establish. From a London paper of September 12. EVACUATION OF SOUTH AMERICA.

The Saracen floop, of 18 guns, arrived yesterday Portfmonth, with dispatches from lieut, general hitelocke, dared the 16th of July, containing ungrateful intelligence, that the British forces ider his command had made an attack upon Buenosyres, but had experienced fo much refistance from numerous forces of the enemy, that after having ined possession of part of the town, it was thought udent to enter into a capitulation, by which it has en agreed to evacuate not only the part of Buenosyres of which our troops had gained possession, t Monteviedo, Maldonado, in fine, the whole of with America, within the fliort space of two months. e following bulletin was fent from the admiralty the lard mayor, and, by his order, posted on the infion-house, and communicated to Lloyd's.

Downing street, Sept. 12, 1807. "Lord Calllereagh has the honour of acquainting loid mayor, that dispatches have been received smorning, from lieut. gen. Whitelocke, dated July by which it appears, that in an attack upon the town Buenos-Ayres, his majesty's troops experienced to ich refiffance from the tumultuous force of the enethat after gaining possession of part of the town, th severe lois, on the 4th of July, the lieut, gen. pught it prudent to enter into a negotiation with n. Liniers, who commanded the enemy's forces, by ich he agreed to evacuate South America within o months, upon condition that all prisoners taken the attack, as well as those captured at the furder of Buenos-Ayres, thould be restored. "To the right konourable the lord mayor." It thus appears that our lofs in killed, wounded, milling, amounts to 1,200 men. The remainder, fording to the terms of the capitulation, are now on their way home.

RUSSIA AND SWEDEN.

It is flated in a letter from Stockholm, of the th of August, that the Russian ambassador had deered a note to the Swedishi government, in which was dedared, that if affiftance we e rendered to Buitish seet, or any part of it admitted into the ts of Sweden, it would be confidered as a declaran of war, and that the emperor of Russia would tch an army into Finland.
