LEGISLATURE.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES, MARYLAND.

THURSDAY, November 5, 1807.

THE house met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. Mr. Thomas Moffit, a delegate returned for Cecil county, appeared, qualified, and took his seat.

Ordered, That the committee of claims procure weekly one copy of the Maryland Gazette for each member of the legislature.

Ordered, That Mr. Stone, Mr. W. H. Brown, Mr. T. Dorsey, Mr. Carroll, Mr. Holbrook, Mr. Belt and Mr. Kerr, be a committee to examine and report what laws expire with the present session.

Mr. Carroll, from the committee appointed to prepare rules, delivers a report; which was twice read, and the first thirty-six rules therein contained assented to.

The question was then put, That the house assent to the 37th rule? Resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the printer to the state be and he is hereby directed to print one hundred copies of every bill, resolution and report, containing subjects of a public nature, which shall be read by the clerk during the present session, also of all official papers, for the use of the members.

Ordered, That the reports of the auditor-general and trustee of the state be referred to the committee of claims.

Leave given to bring in a bill for the encouragement of learning in this state.

A petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying for a public road, was preferred, read, and referred.

Leave given to bring in a bill to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council for the ensuing year, a bill to increase the salary of the chief judge of the sixth judicial district, and a bill to regulate and discipline the militia of this state.

A petition from Monica Greenwell, administratrix of Robert Manning, praying compensation for deficiency in land purchased of the state, was preferred, read, and referred.

Mr. Kerr, from the committee of elections and privileges, delivers a report; which was twice read, and concurred with.

The speaker laid before the house a letter from Upton Laurence, Esq; a delegate returned for Washington county, resigning his seat; which was read.

Mr. Kerr delivers a bill, entitled, An act to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council for the ensuing year; which was read.

A petition from Ely Dorsey, and Araminta his wife, of Frederick county, praying a confirmation of their marriage articles, was preferred, read, and referred.

Leave given to bring in a bill to make valid certain proceedings of the register of wills for Charles county.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning.

FRIDAY, November 6, 1807.

THE house met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Leave given to bring in a bill for the regulation of officers fees.

A petition from Britania Marshall, of Dorchester county, praying to be divorced from her husband; a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying for a new road; a petition from Susan Williams, praying a supplement to the law for her liberation, to include her son and grandson; and a petition from Thomas J. Pattison, late sheriff of Dorchester county, praying a further time to complete his collections, were severally preferred, read, and referred.

Ordered, that the clerk to the governor and council be requested to lay before this house the journal containing the proceedings of the executive for the present year.

A memorial from John Gassaway, register of wills for Anne Arundel county, praying an order of the legislature relative to some of the records in his office which want transcribing, was preferred, read, and referred.

Leave given to bring in a further supplement to the act for amending, and reducing into system, the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, &c.

Mr. Hawkins, from the committee of claims, delivers a report; which was read.

The clerk of the council delivers the journal of the executive for the present year.

Mr. T. Dorsey delivers a bill, entitled, An act to increase the salary of the chief judge of the sixth judicial district; which was read.

The following resolution was assented to.

Resolved, That this house sit, for the dispatch of public business, from the hour of nine o'clock in the morning until three in the afternoon.

Leave given to bring in a bill to encourage the destruction of crows in the several counties therein mentioned.

The speaker laid before the house a letter from Samuel A. Otis Esq; accompanied with a copy of the journals of the senate of the United States at the second session of the ninth congress; which was read.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning.

SAURDAY, November 7.

THE house met. Present as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

Mr. W. H. Brown delivers a favourable report on the petition of Monica Greenwell; which was read.

A petition from the mayor, city council, and others, of the city of Baltimore, praying an appropriation of money for the benefit of the city hospital, and a petition from Joseph Green, late sheriff of Charles county, praying a further time to complete his collection, were preferred, read, and referred.

Leave given to bring in a supplement to the act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors, passed at November session, 1805.

A petition from Sarah Thompson, of Frederick county, praying an additional support for her insane children, was preferred, read, and referred.

A petition from Susanna Beamer, of the city of Baltimore, praying to be divorced from her husband, was preferred and read, and on motion, the question was put, That a standing committee be appointed for all petitions of a similar nature? Determined in the negative, and the said petition referred to a committee.

Leave given to bring in a bill authorizing the levy court of Anne-Arundel county to defray the allowance of the jury men of Anne-Arundel county court in the manner therein mentioned.

Mr. Henry delivers a bill, entitled, An act authorizing Thomas J. Pattison, sheriff and collector of Dorchester county, to complete his collection, which was read.

A petition from Archibald Gordon, of Cecil county, an old soldier, praying assistance from the legislature, was preferred, read, and referred.

Ordered, That the bill authorizing Thomas J. Pattison to complete his collection, be recommitted for amendment.

The clerk of the senate delivers the following message:

The senate having formed a house, are ready to proceed to the business of the session. This house will sit from nine o'clock in the morning until three in the afternoon.

Which was read.

The resolution in favour of John Trueman was sent to the senate.

Mr. Little delivers a bill, entitled, An act to lay out and make a public road in Baltimore county; which was read.

A petition from the trustees of the poor for Washington county, praying money may be levied to reimburse them for advances made for the benefit of the poor, was preferred, read, and referred.

Mr. Frazier delivers a bill, entitled, An act annulling the marriage of Britania Marshall, of Dorchester county; which was read.

Leave given to bring in a bill to pay the civil list, and other expenses of civil government.

A petition from Frederick Green, printer to the state, praying an increase of salary, and payment of a balance due him for printing Kilty's laws, was preferred, read, and referred.

The house adjourns till Monday morning.

MONDAY, November 9, 1807.

THE house met. Present as on Saturday. The proceedings of Saturday were read. Mr. John E. Spencer, Mr. William Sudler and Mr. John Brown, delegates for Queen-Anne's county, Mr. Robert J. King and Mr. George W. Jackson, delegates for Somerset county, Mr. Upton Bruce, a delegate for Allegany county, Mr. Thomas Gardiner and Mr. James Hopewell, delegates for Saint-Mary's county, Mr. Joseph Ennalls, a delegate for Dorchester county, Mr. Zadock Sturgis and Mr. John Dalziel, delegates for Worcester county, and Mr. Thomas Ayres, a delegate for Harford county, appeared, qualified, and took their seats.

The following resolution was read.

Whereas great public inconvenience may hereafter result from the loose imperfect manner in which the records, votes and proceedings, of the legislature of the state of Maryland, from the year 1777 to the year 1805, at present remain, and as it is highly necessary that the property of the citizens of this state should rest upon a firmer basis than a loose collection of papers, subject, from their exposed situation, to be destroyed by accident or design; and as in either case no record of their contents is left to be offered in evidence, if ever they should be required; therefore resolved, That — be a committee to examine the state of the records, votes and proceedings, of the several legislatures of Maryland, from the year 1777 to the year 1804, inclusive, with the liberty of sending for any persons or papers capable of affording information on the subject of their inquiry, and to report to this house, as soon as may be convenient, the result of their investigation.

The bill to settle and ascertain the salary of the members of the council for the ensuing year, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The following resolution was read:
