## IMPORTANT.

BOSTON, November 1. Sunday, 1 o'clock .- The Ariflides, captain Williams, has this moment arrived from Liverpool, in 44 days. Her latest London dates which are to the 14th Sept. announce the following intelligence:

"That the points in controverly between the United States and Great-Britain, had been discussed, by the respective ministers; and that such an amicable adjustment of them had taken place, to warrant a notice, from both parties, "that Peace and Friendthip might be confidered as being again reflored between the two countries."

NEW-YORK, November 5. To captain Rossiter of the ship Laura, from Bristol, we are indebted for Briftol dates to the 12th, and London to the 9th of September, from which we have copied the following articles, corroborating the in elligence received at Boston :-

"We are affured that the dispatches recently received by Mr. Munroe, were of a very conciliatory tendency; and that the tone and spirit in which they were conceived, have already had the happiest effect. It is stated on good authority, that all differences relative to the fearth for feamen are already adjusted, and that a negotiation has commenced for the purpole of concluding a treaty of commerce equally favourable to the trade and navigation of England, and to the true interests of the Americans.

"We are happy to inform our readers that confiderable progrefs has been made in fetlling the dispute with the United States. The dispatches which Mr. Munroe has received were drawn up in a flyle the most temperate and conciliating. We are glad they were fo, for we have learnt from the most indisputable authority, that Mr. Pitt before his death, expressed to one of his political friends his regret at ever having been induced by existing circumstances to relax the maritime rights of Britain; and his determination to re-establish the system which had been acted upon during the administration of his father,-In a

negotiation, therefore, conducted under the auspices of the present ministers, there is no ground for apprehending that any part of the power we have been accustomed to exercise on the ocean, and which is now more than ever necessary we should rigidly main-tain, will be relinquished. To consult the interests of trade is always a wife policy, but no commercial facilities, however advantageous, ought to be purchased by the flightest relaxation of those rights which, while they preferve, at the fame time proclaim to all the world our naval superiority."
