Confidential agents whom he has employed to vifit the feveral tribes have lately returned, and brought with them the refult of feveral meetings and councils held by the chiefs, in all of which it was unanimously determined to preserve their relations of peace and amity with the United States, even if a war between us and Great-Britain should take place.

The few Indians upon the lakes who are under the British influence, are too contemptible in point of number and character as warriors, to undertake any hostile enterprise without the aid and concurrence of the Indians of the Wabash, who are decidedly for peace. The underligned pledges himself for the peaceable disposition of the Delaware, Miami, Wea, Piankashaw and Kickapoo tribes,
