HOUSE OF DELEGATES, MARYLAND.

WEDNESDAY, January 6, 1808.

THE house met. Present as on yesterday. The

proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill to incorporate the contributors to the

Memory general dispensary; the bill to release to

authorized to sell her interest in certain real property,

was preferred, read, and referred.

Mr. Little delivers a bill, entitled, An act to fix

and establish the pay of the adjutant-general and bri-

gue inspectors; which was read.

The amendments proposed to the bill for the relief

of Nathaniel L. Chew, and others, were read the sec-

ond time, the first, second and fifth, dissented from,

and the third and fourth assented to.

On motion, the question was put, That the house

we have agreed, but to the first, second and fifth am-

endments, we have disagreed, and herewith return

them, with a request that you may reconsider the

same, and recede therefrom.

Leave given to bring in a bill authorising and em-
powering the drawing of lotteries in this state for the
purpose of establishing county and parish schools in
this state for the education of poor children, and for
other purposes.The report in favour of Joseph Howard, and o-
thers, was read the second time, and the question
put, That the house concur therewith, and assent to
the resolution therein contained? Resolved in the af-
firmative, yeas 51, nays 15, and the resolution sent to
the senate.Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, A supple-
ment to the act, entitled, An act to amend and ex-
plain the thirty-third section of an act, entitled, An
act for the more effectual paving the streets of Balti-
more-town, in Baltimore county.

Mr. Little delivers the said bill, which was read.

Mr. Stedart delivers a bill, entitled, A further ad-
ditional supplement to the act, entitled, An act to
erect Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, into a
city, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof; which
was read.Ordered, That the same have a second reading on
Friday next.The supplement to the act for founding a college
in the city or precincts of Baltimore, by the name of
Baltimore College, was read the second time, a-
mended, and the question put, Shall the said bill pass?
Resolved in the affirmative, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill to confirm

a certain road thereto mentioned, endorsed, "will
pass." Ordered to be engrossed. The bill to make
public a road in Charles county, endorsed, "will pass
with the proposed amendments;" which amendments
were agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.
And the following message:We have received your message, with the bill in
favour of Robert Leatherbury, late sheriff of Somer-
set county, for our reconsideration. This bill has
been acted on by the senate after mature deliberation,
and we cannot agree to reconsider it.The bill for the opening of Bridge-street in the
precincts of the city of Baltimore, was read the sec-
ond time, passed, and sent to the senate.The report on the petition of George Fitzhigh
was read the second time, and the question put, That
the house concur therewith, and assent to the resolu-
tion therein contained? Determined in the negative,
yeas 14, nays 59.On motion, the question was put, That the house
reconsider the eleventh rule thereof? Determined
in the negative.The question was again put, That the house recon-
sider the said rule? Resolved in the affirmative.The question was then put, That the words "the
names of which members moving for the year and
nays shall be inserted on the journal," be added to the
said rule? Determined in the negative.The question was then put, That the word
"three" be stricken thereout? Determined in the nega-
tive.A petition from John Hayne, of Kent county, on
behalf of himself and others, praying a supplement
to the act for the relief of Margaretta Chalmers, may
be passed, was preferred, read, and referred.

The house adjourns till to-morrow morning.

THE house met. Present as on yesterday. The
proceedings of yesterday were read.The further additional supplement to the act, en-
titled, An act to incorporate companies to make sev-
eral turnpike roads through Baltimore county, and
for other purposes, was read the second time, and passed.Mr. Page delivers a favourable report on the pe-
tition at John Smith Brooks; which was read.The supplement to the act authorising the proprie-
tors of the French-town and New-Castle water and
land stages to open a road from French-town, &c., and the bill ad-
authorising Jasper E. Tilly to complete his collection,severally endorsed, "will pass." Ordered to be en-
grossed. The supplement to the act authorising Jo-
seph Green to complete his collections, endorsed,
"will not pass." The bill for the relief of Nathaniel L. Chew,
and others, endorsed, "on reconsideration the 1st, 2d and 5th amendments receded from."
Ordered to be engrossed. A bill, entitled, A further sup-
plement to the act, entitled, An act to incorpo-
rate companies to make several turnpike roads through
Baltimore county, and for other purposes; a bill, en-
titled, An act to incorporate a society to educate and
maintain poor orphan and other destitute female chil-
dren, by the name of the Orphanage Charity School,
and to repeal the act of assembly therein mentioned,
severally endorsed, "will pass." Which were read.
The resolution in favour of John S. Brooks, endorsed,
"assented to." And an address to the President of
the United States, endorsed, "unanimously assent-
ed to." Which was read.

The further supplement to the act for the regula-

tion and improvement of Denton, in Caroline county,
was read the second time, passed, and sent to the se-
nate.Mr. Welch delivers a bill, entitled, An act autho-
rising William Moffatt, of Kent county, to complete
his collection; which was read the first and second

time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. T. Dorsey delivers a bill, entitled, An act
authorising the drawing of a lottery for the benefit
of the college of Medicine of Maryland; which was
read.

On the second reading of the resolution in favo-

of John Trueman, the question was put, That the
same be withdrawn? Resolved in the affirmative.

On the second reading of the message in favour of

John Trueman, the question was put, That the last

section thereof be stricken out? Resolved in the affir-

mative.

The question was then put, That the following be
added in lieu of the words stricken out? We flatter
ourselves, that when you see the solicitude, arising
from a sense of justice, which this house manifests in
favour of John Trueman, you will give your sanction
to the following resolution, to reward a meritorious
officer.Resolved, That the treasurer of the western trea-
sury be and he is hereby authorised and directed to pay to
John Trueman, or his order, the sum of one hundred
and fifty dollars, out of any unappropriated money in
the treasury of the state of Maryland.

Resolved in the affirmative.

A petition from the regents of the medical college

of medicine of Maryland, praying a law may pass
authorising a lottery to build a house for the benefit
of the same, a memorial from the president and pa-
trons of the Baltimore and Frederick-town turn-
pike roads, praying to be vested with power to locate
certain roads, and a petition from Henry Connel-
