The clerk of the senate delivers the bill for the preservation of the navigation of Cabin creek, the bill authorizing the sale of five thousand tickets in a lottery of the state of Pennsylvania for the encouragement of useful arts, the bill for the relief of Edward Henry, and the further additional supplement to the act for amending, and reducing into system, the laws and regulations concerning last wills and testaments, &c. severally endorsed, "will pass."

Ordered to be engrossed. The further additional supplementary act to the act for quieting possessions, annulling conveyances, and securing the estates of executors, endorsed, "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read.

A bill, entitled, An act for the limitation of appeals and writs of error, endorsed, "will pass;" which was read. The resolution in favour of Elizabeth Barrow, endorsed, "assented to." An the following message:

We have nearly finished all the business now before us, and by a diligent application of our time, shall certainly be prepared to close the present session by Monday next. We therefore propose, with the concurrence of your house, to adjourn on that day.

Which was read. The following order was read.

Ordered, That the house of delegates, when they adjourn to-day, adjourn until to-morrow morning at one o'clock, at which hour the punctual attendance of the members is required.

And the question put, That the house assent to the same? Determined in the negative.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the resolution relative to the investment of money in the banks and turnpike road, and, on motion, that the bill after the words "Mechanics Bank of Baltimore," be filled up with the words "forty thousand dollars;" the question was put, that the further consideration of the same be postponed until Monday? Resolved in the affirmative.

The house adjourns till Monday morning.

WASHINGTON CITY.

From the National Intelligencer of January 15.

We have at length the pleasure of announcing the arrival of Mr. ROSE in this city. After a cloud of general untruths which has so long obscured the public vision with regard to the sources of embarrassment as well as the actual situation of this gentleman, his certain arrival at the seat of government may be properly considered as cause of felicitation. We understand that the instructions sent by our government to the collector at Norfolk, were considered by Mr. Rose as perfectly satisfactory, and that on the 9th ult. he took passage in a packet for this place. On Wednesday, in consequence of the accidental detention of this vessel below Mount-Vernon, a barge was dispatched for him from the Navy yard, (in virtue we presume, of directions from the navy department;) in which he reached the navy yard on the ensuing night. We venture, confidently to say, that every facility, towards his prompt reception, in the power of the executive, has been rendered.

NEWBERN BANK NOTES.

The public have, of late, been very much troubled by the great number of these notes in circulation in this city, and we feel confident that if their issue was generally known, it would not be long before they would be driven from this place in disgrace.

The following circumstances deserve publicity: The capital of the bank consists only of fifty thousand dollars, upon which they have issued a great quantity of paper—they are in no danger of a run, because there is a State Currency in N. C. which by law is a legal tender in all payments, and this currency so old, ragged and defaced, and so many counterfeits afloat that people are afraid of it—This currency has now got mostly into the bank, and whoever calls on the bank can receive nothing else in exchange; they have given their notes a sort of currency in Virginia by holding out to the merchants of Norfolk and Petersburg, that they will make good payments to persons coming from there, though they refuse it to persons resident in Newbern—one hundred dollars of gold, silver or United States bank notes, will purchase one hundred and five dollars Newbern notes from a director of the bank.

SENATE.

Tuesday, January 19, 1808.

THE bill, entitled, An act for the removal of the seat of government from Annapolis to the city of Baltimore, was read the second time, and the question put, Shall this bill pass? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

So it was resolved in the affirmative, and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

So it was determined in the negative.

Captain Mun, of the ship Chesapeake, arrived off this city on Tuesday last, in 112 days from Batavia; previous to his leaving that port intelligence had been received there of the capture of the Cape of Good Hope by the French—in lat 27, long 69, spoke the brig Little John, from Martinique bound to Boston, who had been boarded by a ship from the Cape bound to Nantucket, then out 100 days, who also informed of the above event, with the addition, that several British ships of war and East-Indiamen were captured at the same time.

Admiral Hartinck, and several other passengers, have arrived in the Chesapeake.

Left at Batavia ship Sidney, capt. Davey, of Baltimore, to fail in 25 days; ship William Penn, of ditto, in 40 days, ship Manhattan, captain Brown, of New York, to fail in 10 days.

Spoke off the island of Ascension, the ship Ceres, captain Cuyfick, 71 days from Bengal bound to New-York.

Mr. Rose was, on Saturday last, presented to the President of the United States.

Mr. VAN-HORN on the 12th inst. in congress, presented a memorial from the mayor, aldermen, common council and citizens of ANNAPOLIS stating the great importance of that place to the trade of the Chesapeake, and praying congress to take measures to have suitable fortifications erected there. Referred to the Secretary at War.

The legislature of South-Carolina adjourned at 10 o'clock on Saturday night, 12th ult. They have appropriated 80,000 dols. for arming the militia of that state.
