The prince regent of Portugal carried with him, in his flight to the Brazils, property to the amount of one hundred millions of dollars, thirty millions of which were in specie.

> The Paris Argus, of Dec. 10, contains the Prefident's meffage to congress at the commencement of the present session the following are the remarks of

> "We have just received American papers to the 30th October. The most important article of their contents is the meffage fent to congress, at the opening of its fession by the president Jefferson. This message gives the most favourable idea of the situation of the United States, and of the improvements made in the finances and policy of the country. It deferibes in the most lively colours the indignation with which the outrages of the British navy have filled the breasts of the Americans; and announces a eletermined resolution in the United States not to content themselves with the half fatisfaction which the British government offered to them, for the purpose of elading the difficulties of the moment,"

> Among the great number of reports more or less curious, which often fill the Gazettes of the north of Germany, the following one particularly attracts attention :- "Thirty-three rich and respectable Hanoverian families, composed of 3000 individuals have agreed on felling their property, and expatriating tl emfelves .- Thefe emigrants go neither to Ruffia nor to America, their intention is to go to fettle in the Canary islands, and to transport to this delicious climate their industry and information. It is faid that all the preparations are already made, and that they - are secure of a favourable reception; the first materials necessary for their establishment, and even of a finall mercantile flotilla. The fmall colony means to have no ecclefiastical establishment. A strict courle of morals, and natural history will form the basis of education. A disciple of M. Pistalozzi, and some mathematicians, will accompany the colonists."

INSURRECTION.

We are forry to learn by the Kennebeck Gazettes that an opposition of the Plymonth Grant, in the county of Kennebeck, has affumed a shape to formidable, as to require the interference of military power. As the deputy theriff, Mr. Johnson, was passing through Fairfax, a person dressed in an Indian garb. demanded his papers. He declared he had no writs of to his party, and one of them followed him into even ry house he entered through the day. In the evening in the town of Fairfax he was again required to deliver his papers. On refuling, a double loaded musket was discharged upon him, his horse killed, and he received two balls, happily neither proved fatal.

Two other men have been stripped by these rebels, and this spirit of opposition has become so outrageous, that Mr. Lithgow, the high sheriff, has demanded of maj. gen. Sewal, 400 of the militia, who have accordingly been ordered to be ready at a moment's warning, to support, and defend the civil authority.

PORTUGAL.

Norfolk, February 2.

Captain Dormon, of the Bremen barque Bremen, arrived here on Saturday last, from St. Ube's, which place he left on the 30th of November. On the 5th December, captain Dorman fell in with, and was boarded from the Portuguese ship Triumpha Americano, capt. Joaquim Joze France, one of the fleet from Lisbon bound to Brazils, from whom capt. D. derived the important information, that the French troops had entered Portugal, and would probably be in Lisbon by the 6th or 7th of Dec. and that on the 30th of Nov. the Prince, with the royal fami'y, and many of the nobles, embarked and failed for Brazil; They were met at the mouth of the Tagus by an English sleet of men of war and transports; the latter probably for the purpole of taking a part of the persons who had embarked in the fleet. All English persons and property had got off by some means; thus completely disappointing the French government, who no doubt calculated upon confiderable booty. The commander of the English sleet off Lisbon had not been apprifed of the part which Russia had taken in the war, or it is probable the Russian fleet at Lifbon would have been compelled to depart also; they however remained with their new allies, and whether the English will make any attempt or not, will depend on the strength of the batteries in the Tagus. The English sleet were off the mouth of that river on the 5th December.

Before capt. D. left St. Ube's, public notice had been given to the troops, of the intended departure of the prince for the Brazils, in which the option of going or remaining in Portugal was given.

Captain King of the ship Intrepid of this port, arrived here yesterday from Waterford. Captain K. was originally bound to St. Ube's, but on the 24th of December, off Lisbon, was boarded from his Britanic majesty's ship Conqueror of 74 guns, the fleet under the command of admiral Sir Sidney Smith, then within hail in the Hibernia of 120 guns. The officer who boarded the Intrepid, informed capta K. that the French having possession of St. Ube's, and indeed of all Portugal, he could not go in, endorfed his register, and turned him off.

This officer further informed captain King, that the prince regent, with the royal family, left the Tagus on the 30th of November, as stated in our last. The approach of the French army was so rapid, that the fleet came out very short of provisions, with which they were furnished from the British fleet. Sir Sidney Smith sent four fail of the line with the Portuguese fleet to Brazil. The Ruffian fleet was fill in the Tagus, the batteries being too strong to permit ah attack to be made upon it.
