be enlifted to ferve 12 months, within the term of 3 years, at luch times and places as the president of the United States shall direct, to be armed and equipped by the U. S. and to be regularly encamped in their respective states and territories from 2 to 3 months in each year; and to be exercised under the direction of inspectors to be appointed by the president of the U. S, to receive pay and rations and one fuit of uniform closeling once in three or four years, the officers, except the inspectors and paymasters, to be appointed by the respective states, the pay annually to commence the day they march for the respective encampments, and to continue until their return home, allowing 1 day for each 20 miles march to and from the encampments; no corporal punishments to be inflicted, but all offences to be punished by close confinement and fhort allowance or fines, or both, the commissioned officers to be governed by the rules and articles of war established for the regular army; the 24,000 to be appropriated on the states and territories, in such proportion as circumftances may require, and, in fuch proportions of infantry, artillery, cavalry and rifle-pen, as the president of the United States shall direct, and organized into companies, battalions, regiments and brigades or other corps, as shall be found expedient according to the numbers in each state respectively, and to be encamped in the respective states and territories at fuch times and places as the prefident of the U. S. shall from time to time direct.

## No. II.

The fix thouland regular troops may confift of five regiments of infantry, one regiment of riflemen, one regiment of light artillery, and one regiment of light cavalry. The regiments of infantry, riflemen and artillery, to confift of ten companies each, and the regiment of cavalry of eight companies. The field and staff of each regiment to confist of one col. one major, one adjutant, one quartermaster, one surgeon, one furgeon's mate, one fergeant major, one quartermaster tergeant, and two principal musicians, and the regiment of cavalry one riding mafter.

Each company of cavalry to confift of one capt. one first lieut, one second lieut, one entign, four fergrants, four corporals, four muficians, one faddler, one farrier, and 38 privates.
