It appears by the arrival of a gentleman of information at Charleston from Europe, that a grand effort is about to be made for the procuring of a general peace. A general congress is proposed to be called to which the English are to be invited to send. The basis of the peace is to be a general acknowledgment of the liberty of the seas upon liberal principles. The British are to be allowed to retain their navy and their conquelts. If they refuse, all the continental powers are to unite in their humiliation. A plan to this effect is faid to have been submitted to Buonaparte. The army for its accomplishment is to confife of 300,000 men, divided into three grand divisions; two minor divisions called the right wing, under the" command, one of the crown prince of Denmark; the other under prince Constantine, are to proceed from the Baltic; the grand army from France and Holland; and the left wing from Spain, Portugal and the Mediterranean ports. America is not to be required to join the contest, but to withhold from the British her wonted supplies. The naval force to con-fish of 200 (ail of the line! 300 trigates and 4000 gun-boats, brigs, floops of war, &c. &c The expense to be defrayed by all the nations engaged in this gigantic enterprize for the restoration of a gene-[American.]
