

HESSIAN FLY.

We are informed by a gentleman, who this morning received a letter from his manager in Waltham county, that the *Fly* has made its appearance in that part of this state. Much injury to the wheat is apprehended this season. [Fed. Gaz.]

The legislature of the state of Georgia is now in session, having been convened by the government with a view to afford some relief to the debtors at present distressed by the operation of the embargo. The governor of the state has informed the legislature that a proposition has been sent by the Creek nation of Indians, to assure him of the unanimous determination of the Creeks to defend the state of Georgia with all their strength, in case of a rupture with any foreign power. It is also said that they have sent a deputation to the general government to make a tender of their services. It was expected that the legislature would adjourn on the 21st ult. [Ibid.]

SUGAR MAPLE.

Mr. Luke Baker, of Princeton, in the county of Worcester, (Massachusetts,) during the past season, erected 20 taps into one maple tree, on his farm, by means of which he drew 23 gallons and 5 quarts of sap in one day, which being boiled into sugar made 7 pounds and a quarter; and the whole quantity of sugar made from the same tree, this season, is 33 pounds; which must have required, according to the above proportion, upwards of 108 gallons of sap. The above facts are given under Mr. Baker's own hand.

On the 2d of last month, a monument was erected in the garden of the Pennsylvania Hospital, in honor of CHARLES NICHOLLS, whose legacy to the hospital was mentioned in one of our papers published January last. The marble is American, and the workmanship elegant, and highly honourable to the artist, Mr. Adam Traquair, who planned and executed it.

The following is the inscription upon it.

IN MEMORY OF CHARLES NICHOLLS,

Born in the Island of Jersey, November 1759, and died in Philad. Dec. 31, 1807. GREAT INDUSTRY, ECONOMY AND INTEGRITY, He acquired a considerable estate, FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS Of which he bequeathed to the PENNSYLVANIA HOSPITAL, and the residue, in other charities, and in legacies to his friends. A body is interred in this place: and this monument is erected over it, TO PERPETUATE HIS NAME, By permission of the managers of the hospital, BY ONE OF HIS EXECUTORS.

Possessed of gentle manners, a cultivated mind, and a benevolent disposition, she had on the hearts of those to whom she was known, and whom the memory of her virtues will be cherished. lately, at Hammersmith, England, in his 54th year, John Rice, Esq. a character miserable and penurious. Mr. Rice was born in Westminster, and having received a musical education, he resolved to try his fortune in America. He failed for New-York, where he settled and got an appointment as an agent. In this situation, denying himself the common necessaries of life, accumulated a considerable sum of money, and returned to England. His habit was that of the most indigent beggar, and his deplorable miserable was his garb and appearance, that he was turned out of two lodgings he took. At length he obtained a room at a glazier's shop near Marsham-street, London, where he was taken very ill. He resented he might be decently clothed, and conveyed to Mr. Boyce, at Hammersmith, whose father, he had, was his most intimate acquaintance. He was accordingly taken there, where he survived only a few days. After his death, his will was opened, by which he appeared that he had bequeathed 20,000l to Mr. Boyce, and 10,000l. to the bishop of New-York. It is said to have died worth 40,000l.

MASSACHUSETTS LEGISLATURE.

June 1. The Resolutions of Mr. Wheaton, (in the first page of this day's paper,) being the order of the day, were taken up. They were supported by Messrs. Wheaton, Baylies, Adams, Thatcher, Sargent, Whitman, Bates and Gore, and opposed by Messrs. Bangs, Weston, Ripley, Martin and Morton. The house adjourned without a decision.

In no debate before in our house of representatives has more information and talents been displayed, or more auditors been collected.

June 2.

The consideration of Mr. Wheaton's resolutions was resumed. Mr. Story spoke against them, and Mr. Bradbury in their favour. At one o'clock the question was taken by yeas and nays, and decided in the affirmative—yeas 246, nays 219—majority for the resolutions 27.

Counsellors.—At 4 o'clock the house proceeded to the election of nine counsellors, vice the gentlemen chosen on Tuesday, who declined serving. The following gentlemen had the number of votes affixed to their names, and were elected:
