

land, owing to the excess committed by the military (not the militia of the island) in which a planter is said to have lost his life—they demanded the assassins to be given up to the civil authority—it was refused by the commander in chief, and the governor joining in resisting the assembly—they on their part immediately stop the supplies for the current year.

The governor finding this body refractory *proposed them to die.*  
Whoever will seriously look at these proceedings and compare them with the assembly of Massachusetts in the years 1773-4, may possibly indulge a hope, that so important an island as Jamaica, will ere long shake off the yoke of the tyrant of the seas.

Extract of a letter from Milledgeville, dated 15th inst.

The court of impeachment have convicted all the commissioners, and have sentenced them to removal from office, and disqualification during his natural life; Simms for forty, and Flournoy for twenty years. The three are to pay eighteen hundred dollars in the treasury, as costs of prosecution, and stand committed until paid. An amendment to the alleviating law has passed the senate, and in the lower house has also passed, with some amendments. It authorises suits to be commenced, unless the defendant will pay one third of the amount down, and give a bond for security for the residue; and the like provision is made as to executions. The estimated property has been given to the hospital, and there is a probability that the funds of the orphan-house will be divided between the hospital, the union society, and a county academy. The grand jury, of the circuit court, have presented Judge Johnston for improper interference with the executive, in granting a *Mandamus* in Charleston, some time since.

The governor of Grand Canary has prevailed over a great body of his adherents to a new doctrine; this was strongly opposed by the friends of Ferdinand VII. but French had the advantage; they dissolved the assembly of the island, and imprisoned some members attached to the new cause; and was a scene of confusion, and the people were fearful the whole would end in a civil war.

A letter from Halifax, dated 17th ult. says, "the destination of the secret expedition from hence will be published on Tuesday next." [Boston Centinel.]

Look out!!!—A report from Washington of a pretty imposing nature is in circulation, that Mr. Erskine has informed the government that the expedition lately fitted out at Halifax, intends in the first place to visit Baton Rouge, in possession of their friends and allies the Spaniards. Report further adds, that since this intimation was given, Wilkinson has been ordered to New-Orleans, where he is to take the command of 4000 troops, and is to be aided by two frigates and 40 gun-boats, now fitted out for that place. Why, however, a force should be sent to New-Orleans any the more because the English mean to navigate the river Mississippi, conjecture must still be at a loss; for it is clear to a demonstration that they have a perfect right to do so as secured by the treaty of peace, and recognized by one of the permanent articles of the treaty of amity and commerce.—By the third article of the latter it is stipulated that

"The river Mississippi shall, according to the treaty of peace, be entirely open to both parties.

By the 8th article of the treaty of peace it is stipulated;—

"The navigation of the river Mississippi, from its source to the ocean, shall for ever remain free and open to the subjects of Great-Britain.

It is to be hoped that if the torch of war with any nation is to be lighted, even by the hand of a Wilkinson, it will be such a war as the nation can conscientiously unite in to support the government, and not one occasioned by the barefaced attempt to deprive any foreign power of rights secured to her by solemn treaty. Let the people look out.

Late Rumours.

Mr. Coleman declares in his last paper, that the above rumoured destination is unfounded. "It is morally certain, says he, that it has gone against Guadalupe and Martinique." Another New-York print says it has gone to conquer Cayenne.

British Request.

The British minister has requested our executive to grant leave to British vessels to ascend the Mississippi to Baton Rouge in West-Florida. The president refuses to comply. Mr. Erskine is said to have remarked that it is quite immaterial, for as we are bound by treaty with Spain to suffer Spanish vessels to come to that place, the intercourse which the British government has in view can be carried on through that channel. [Freeman's Journal.]

Yesterday four ships chartered by government to convey troops to New-Orleans, dropped down the bay for Annapolis, to avoid being detained by the ice. All the troops have not yet arrived, but are momentarily expected. They will embark at Annapolis for their port of destination. [Balt. Am. Jan. 9.]

Between the hours of two and three on Saturday morning last, the printing office of Messrs. George Dobbin and Murphy was discovered on fire. The building, with an elegant and extensive assortment of printing materials, was destroyed by the ravages of the all devouring element.—A frame building in Harrison-street was also consumed, and another rendered untenable. [Ibid.]

The governor of Delaware has not failed to comply with the requisition of the general government, as stated sometime ago. He has given public orders to draught and equip out of the three brigades, 1330 men, officers included.

MURGO-PARKE

Accounts have been received from Africa, dated August 20, by Mr. James G. Jackson, Professor of the Arabic and African languages, by a caravan, which performed the journey across the desert, or Sahara, from Timburtoo, to Morocco, in 105 days; by which it appears that Mr. Parke's interpreter to the Sultan of Soudan arrived there with the caravan, but neither he nor any other person knew any thing certain of Mr. Parke's death. The Tuarick, and Brabeesh Arabs had committed depredations in the neighbourhood of Timburtoo. Four hundred loads of gum Soudan had arrived at Mogadore, from that emporium of central Africa, besides a large quantity of gold-dust, ivory, &c. The only circumstance that affords a colour of probability to the report of Mr. Parke's death is, that sometime since a fort on the river Niger had been stormed, and all the Christians found there put to death; but it is pretty well ascertained that Mr. Parke was not at that time in the neighbourhood of the Niger. [Press.]

A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS the executive of the State of Virginia hath lately demanded the executive of the state of Maryland to detain GEORGE GORDON, of Virginia, a fugitive from justice, alledged to be going large in this state, and hath transmitted an inquisition, taken by a coroner's inquest, on the twenty-first day of September, in the year eighteen hundred and six, in Cumberland county, in said state of Virginia, charging said George Gordon with feloniously shooting and killing a certain Negro slave called Beley; I have therefore issued this my Proclamation, commanding and enjoining on all civil officers, and others, citizens of this state to arrest and commit said George Gordon to the jail of the county in which he may be found, and to give notice thereof to the executive of Maryland, that the executive of Virginia may be duly notified thereof agreed to the act of congress in such case provided.

Given under my hand and the seal of the state of Maryland, at the city of Annapolis, this twentieth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eight, and of the independence of the United States of America the thirty-third.
