

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 1809.

On Tuesday and Wednesday last the transports with troops left the river Severn, bound for New-Orleans. Gen. Wilkinson also sailed on Wednesday on the schooner Wolf Jones for Charleston. It is stated he will embark there on board of a sloop of war Hornet, for New-Orleans, his leaving this port a salute was fired by a detachment of Capt. Muir's artillery company.

The Senate have passed, without opposition, the bill for an Extra Meeting of Congress on the 4th Monday in May. It consequently only requires the signature of the President to be a law. [Nat. Intel.]

Gen. Dearborne will be appointed collector of Boston—the nomination of William Duane as Lt. Col. in the service of the United States, said to be confirmed by the Senate—20 to [Ev. Post.]

Gen. Linieres, viceroy of Paragury, has declared in favour of king Joseph of Spain. [Ibid.]

From a Montreal paper of Jan. 9. The road across the river was hardly made, the streets of Montreal were crowded with American sleighs, some from our own shippers, but infinitely more from the other side of the lines—full of pork, butter, cheese. They flocked in as if the embargo had broke loose. They have a brisk market of it. We are not misinformed, there are not less than 500 sleighs on the road to this city.

Governor Penning of Rhode Island, has ordered out a division of the state militia to enforce the embargo laws at the point of the Hornet, by assisting the acting collector of Providence in the duties of his office. [American.]

Extract of a letter from Providence, (R. I.) dated Jan. 20th.

This day Col. Olney, the collector of this port, and brother, have enclosed their commissions and resigned their offices, declaring, as they have taken an oath to support the constitution, they cannot possibly act as the direct agents of its evident violation in the execution of the last law for enforcing the embargo. There is now no custom-house here."

On the 21st of November, in London, the price of Flour was 90 shillings per sack, equal to 63 shillings sterling the American barrel. Cotton, 3 shillings to 3s. 6d. per lb. Tobacco, 2 shillings to 2s. 2 1-2 per lb. [Norfolk Ledger.]

Arrived at New-York the dispatch brig Hamlet, capt. Rice, 53 days from Rio Janeiro and Salvador. The ports of the Brazils were open to all powers in amity with the prince regent; our consul, Mr. Hill, who went out on the Hamlet, was received with the utmost cordiality. Passengers, Mr. King and Mr. Wilby, secretary of legation, who went out on the Hamlet to confer with the prince regent. Great rejoicings had taken place at Rio Janeiro, on account of the success of the patriots of Spain over the French; the place had been illuminated three days and three nights.—There was the most friendly disposition towards Americans at Rio Janeiro; at which place there were 15-British ships of the line, and many merchant ships. The Prince Regent and royal family were delighted with their new residence. She has dispatches for government.

It appears by the advertisement in this day's Gazette, that our collector has made a selection of vessels from France, and England. The ship Pacific goes to Falmouth, and the Mentor for L'Orient—both vessels built in this city, by A. & N. Brown. There is no more in the first choice, and wisdom in the second. May these results grow out of this "experiment." [N. Y. Gazette.]

The British schooner Swift, Young, has arrived at Reedy Island from Porto Rico, with 1000 lbs of cable and anchors. She left Porto Rico on the 23d Dec. Previous to her sailing, a Spanish vessel arrived from St. Andro, with dispatches to the 16th Nov. stating that the Spaniards had obtained a great victory, and captured Pampeluna. Capt. Young also informs, that the British had taken Martinico, with the loss of 730 men. The city of St. Domingo had offered to capitulate to the governor of Porto Rico, and an officer had been dispatched to St. Domingo for that purpose. [Phil. Paper.]
