

**FORGERY.**  
A young man was arrested in this city on Friday evening last on suspicion of being concerned in counterfeiting bank notes. Notes of the bank of the U. States—Pennsylvania and some of the Jersey banks, to the amount of 3973 dollars, were found on him in his saddle-bags. Some of the notes signed and others blank. It is a fact not generally known, that all five dollar notes of the bank of the United States are counterfeit. They issue no note for less than ten dollars. [Phil. Paper.]

The editor of *El Mississippi*, a Spanish paper printed at New-Orleans, makes the following observations on Buonaparte's conquest of Spain. We do not think it worth while to publish the New Constitution of Spain, because it is ridiculous to hear scoundrels talk about equity, usurpers about justice, tyrants about clemency, and liars about truth. The commencement is sufficient to disgust us.—"Joseph Napoleon by the grace of God King of Spain and the Indies." Of God? Say rather by the frauds, robberies and crimes of his brother—by the weakness of Charles—by the credulity of Ferdinand and the vile parasites that surrounded and betrayed him, or by the ridiculous coronation of the officious bishop of Burgos. We shall publish in lieu of the Constitution an account of the glorious battles which the patriots of Spain have fought and won; should they continue to be successful (which we ardently desire) this celebrated constitution may be returned to the "Pigeon-hole" from whence it was probably taken, regenerated Spain, with the religion and laws of her ancestors, will again take a high rank among the independent nations of the world, covered with fame & glory."

**BRITISH PRISONERS.** (Viz.) Jan. 20. The supreme court closed their session in London, on Saturday. On the same day, J. I. Mott, David Sheffield and Francis Ford, who had been tried on an indictment for the murder of Ormsby and Marsh, were convicted of manslaughter, were sentenced the two former to stand one hour in pillory, receive fifty stripes, to be imprisoned seven years at hard labour and to pay the expenses of prosecution. The latter received the same sentence, excepting the fifty stripes. The two first mentioned parts of the sentence were executed on Tuesday.

The jury in the case of Mudgett, could not agree on a verdict, and the prisoner was discharged from that indictment; but stands committed for trial at the next January term, on an indictment for the murder of Ellis Drake.

**MUTINY.**  
The 7th inst. the schooner Rising States, Shaw, laden with 238 bales of cotton, 7 tierces of rice, cleared regularly at this port for New-York; crew consisting of the following persons: Jabez Shaw master; Samuel Jones, Wm. Pierce and Wm. Whitham, and a number of colour mariners; together with Mr. Richard Kelly and a Mr. Brown, passengers. On the 12th soon after leaving the island, capt. Shaw being in the cabin a noise on deck, and, on coming up, the vessel heaved too. Capt. S. immediately ordered the helm to be put up. Kelly, a passenger, replied that it should not be put up. Capt. S. he was no longer master of the vessel. The cabin door was then shut, a small boat let down along side, and capt. Shaw entered into it by Kelly and all the rest of the people on board, except William Kelly. On refusing to leave the vessel, Kelly, they lifted him up and threw him into it. He then laid hold of the helm but was compelled to desist in consequence of their repeated threats to knock his brains. Kelly and Brown offered him money to join them; but he declined, was ordered into the boat with capt. S. and a small piece of boiled beef. The boat, they cast her off from the vessel, hoisted all sail, and bearing away south, with a fresh N. West wind, in a short time out of sight. Tybee house being then 15 miles and more distant from the Hunting Islands, capt. S. and Kelly made for the latter, which they did a little before sunset, and remained on the sand-hills without either provisions or water. Next day they were taken by a party of gentlemen who had been sent on the islands and conveyed to St. Augustine, in South Carolina, from whence they proceeded to Beaufort, where they were before the intendancy; and proceeding to place protested a second time, in substance similar to the foregoing.

The Rising States is owned by Messrs. Alden and Co. of N. York; was consigned to and loaded by Messrs. Ogden's and Co. of this city; and the bonds for re-landed cargo in the U. States, are subscribed by Messrs. Ogden and Baker, Merrill and Parkhurst, and Jabez Shaw. She is supposed to have sailed for Europe.

**Patriotism of the Ladies.**  
Lancaster, which could always justly boast of its amiable and industrious fair, acquires new honour from their exertions at the present period of national calamity. In promoting domestic manufactures at this awful crisis in the public sentiment, the ladies of Lancaster justly deserve the smiles of the patriot and the applause of their country. More flax and cotton have already been spun in this borough, than ever was known in a season. Some of the linen is equal in fineness, and far superior in quality, to Irish Holland, which sells in the stores at nine or ten shillings a yard. Spinning parties have become fashionable in some of the highest circles—and rank, fortune, youth and beauty, receive additional lustre from the "swirling of the distaff." [Lancaster Journal.]

A passenger in the Southern Stage states, that the committee of foreign relations, to whom was referred the several resolutions concerning the raising of the Embargo, &c. reported a bill yesterday, the amount of which is to take off the embargo the 4th of March, pass a non-intercourse act with England and France, and their dependencies, and permit merchant vessels to arm in defence (this last not certain.)—The bill was read twice, and made the order of the day for Tuesday next. Charles the Fourth, (late king of Spain,) his queen, and Godoy (the prince of peace,) have been removed to the palace of Chambard, near Blois, 'till the seat of Navarre, near Evreux, in Normandy, which belonged to the late Duc de Bouillon, can be prepared for their reception. The queen of Euryria, and her young son, are placed at a house in the village of St. Mandez, near Paris, under proper care; Ferdinand, and his two brothers, the infant Charles, Isidore, who is near 21 years of age, and the infant Francis, who is about 14, continue closely confined in the castle of Valency. It was Buonaparte's intention, some weeks ago, to have removed Ferdinand to Paris, and he was taken out of his prison for that purpose; but on the road to the capital, counter orders arrived, and he was remanded into confinement. Napoleon, doubtless, reserves him to be liberated, or not, according to circumstances and events. [London pap.]

The proceeds of the late concert given for the relief of distressed seamen, in this city, amounted to 1194 dollars, and the expenses attending the same to 120 dolls. 87½ cents, leaving 1073 dolls. 12½ cents, the everlasting monument of honourable munificence. [Balt. American.]

Captain Little, who arrived here yesterday in 20 days from St. Kitts, informs, that intelligence was received there previous to his sailing that the British expedition had raised the siege of Martinique, and were going to winter at Barbadoes. [N. Y. Merc. Adv.]

Rice Jones, Esq; a member of the house of Representatives of the Indiana Territory, was deliberately murdered in the streets of Kaskaskias, on the 7th of December, by Dr. James Dunlap. Five hundred dollars are offered for the apprehending of Dunlap. [Phil. pap.]

A proposition, to suspend sales by execution in this state, (N. York,) is now under consideration, and it is thought, will become a law, the country members being very anxious for it. [Amer. Cit.]

**A PROCLAMATION.**
