REVOLUTION IN TURKEY.

From the London Courier of Dec. 20.

The late revolution in Turkey holds out a
very flattering prospect not only for this
country, but for Europe. Bairracter, the
chief actor in it, is a bold, shrewd, enterpris-
ing man, equal to the times in which he has
appeared and the situation he has attained.
It is supposed he has been chosen and elevat-
ed by the great religious Council, which in
fact possesses the power of the state, as a fit
instrument in their hands to resist the plans
of partition of the Turkish Empire which
have come to their knowledge, and to defeat
the ambitious designs of France, as well as
of Russia. Bairracter declares it is his wish
to be at peace with all the world, and that
his greatest object is to preserve inviolate the
integrity of the Empire of the Ottomans.—
Hence Mr. Adair found an easy admission
into Constantinople, where he has been well
received, a fact which the Moniteur at first
denied, though now admits it. About the
10th of October Mr. Adair presented him-
self at the Dardanelles, to which place a
rowboat of 16 oars came from Constantinople
to receive him with due respect. Arrived at
Constantinople, he was surrounded by all the
old English Dragoman or interpreters, and
the last accounts left him highly satisfied with
his situation, confident of succeeding in his
mission. The knowledge of the principles of
the new government had induced most of the
English merchants to return to Smyrna from
Malta, and great quantities of goods had
been sent thither. Bairracter had even car-
ried his system of neutrality so far, as to or-
der that English ships of war should not be
molested in attacking French ships of war in
any of the parts of the Archipelago. This is
equivalent to a declaration of war against
France. He has beheld the governor of the
ports of the Dardanelles, notoriously in
the French interest, and has put many others
to death whom he suspected of being inimical
to his designs. Such is his boldness, and
the terror with which he is beheld, that he
frequently seizes a chief officer at the head
of his troops, in presence of whom the offi-
cer is instantly beheaded. He had summon-
ed a Grand Council of all the Pachas of the
Empire (governors of the provinces) as well
of Asia as of Europe, to be held at Adriano-
ple about the end of November. Against
such as declined coming, with their troops
too, he was immediately to send a force to
displace them. Before this Council he was
to lay the facts of which he was possessed, re-
specting the dismemberment of the Turkish
Empire, and to propose the necessary mea-
sures for self-protection. Such as opposed
him it was believed he would put to death on
the spot. The place of meeting marks his
design of resisting Russia. It was supposed
some of the northern pachas, next the Rus-
sian territories, would decline appearing;
the consequence of which would be, that all
the others would march against them. This
state of affairs gives Buonaparte, no doubt,
uneasiness; and hence the anxiety of the
Moniteur to supply us with Turkish news of
its own manufacture. Placed between Tur-
key and England, the Moniteur hopes to
blind the English government respecting the
state of affairs at Constantinople; but it is
self deceived.

CARACCAS.

News had been received at Trinidad of a
combination among several of the officers
and some other principal characters, to es-
tablish an independent government in Caraccas,
(Spanish Main)—but the people rose in the
cause of Ferdinand VII. and seized the re-
volutionists, 24 of whom had been beheaded.

FREE TRADE WITH HAYTI.

Mr. Fawcener presents his compliments to

SPOTTED FEVER.

HARTFORD, (CON.) March 9.

In our last paper was a remark that it was
rare indeed that we were called upon to re-
cord to distressing an occurrence as we had
then to make public.—Since that time, how-
ever, a similar event has made it our melan-
choly duty to depict a new and unexampled
scene of affliction; in the family of Jona-
than Bull, Esq; of this city, the sudden death
of three amiable daughters has spread a gloom,
the sorrows of which, it is our happiness that
few have the misfortune to experience. In
the afternoon, on Monday of last week, Miss
Nancy Bull was seized with the prevailing
fever—before noon on Tuesday she was a
corpse—aged 28 years.—Miss Hannah Bull
was seized on Tuesday and died on Wednes-
day, just as her deceased sister was going to
the grave—aged 32 years.—Miss Rebecca
Bull was seized on Wednesday and died the
same night, and on Thursday was buried in
the same grave with her last deceased sister—
aged 22 years.—Reflecting upon so melan-
choly a picture what can we do but shrink
into submissive and "expressive silence."

After writing the above paragraph, we had
hopes that our distressing task was at an end;
but alas, how vain are all human expecta-
tions!

On Wednesday died Mrs. Mary Dodd,
wife of Mr. John Dodd, postmaster, after
an illness of four days, aged 56 years. The
day preceding her death Mr. Dodd himself
was taken ill, and expired on Sunday morn-
ing, in the 66th year of his age. On the
night following died his oldest son, Mr. John
Dodd, jr. merchant, aged 43 years, after a
short illness. And on Monday died captain
Josiah Dodd, nephew of the late postmaster,
aged 50 years. Died also in the course of
the week two children of Mr. Joseph Pratt, jr.

The State of Maryland, and the legal Repre-
sentatives of John and Samuel Buchanan,
vs.
THE object of the bill is to obtain a
deed from the Chancellor for a tract of
land called WELSH'S FOLLY, lying and be-
ing in Anne-Arundel county. The bill states
that about the year one thousand seven hun-
dred and sixty-nine, the complainant being
indebted to a certain John Buchanan, a sub-
ject of the king of Great-Britain, in the sum
of three hundred and twenty-two pounds
eight shillings and three pence, sterling, to
secure the payment of the same assigned to a
certain Samuel Buchanan, son of the said
John Buchanan, a certificate of the said tract,
purchased of the then lord proprietor, by the
complainant, and as an additional security
executed his bond for the payment of the
said sum, with interest! That it was agreed,
in writing, between the said Samuel Bucha-
nan and the complainant, that a patent should
issue on the said certificate, so assigned, in the
name of the said Samuel Buchanan, and that
upon the complainant's paying up the sum
due on his bond the said Buchanan would
make a conveyance of the land to the com-
plainant, and deliver up his bond to be can-
celled; that patent did accordingly issue in
the name of the said Samuel Buchanan, and
that the complainant has fully discharged the
money due on his said bond. The bill fur-
ther states that Gilbert Buchanan is the
surviving representative of John and Samuel
Buchanan, that being a British subject, and
not entitled to hold real property within the
state, the complainant has been unable to ob-
tain the legal title to said land; it is there-
upon, on motion of the complainant, ordered
and adjudged, that he cause a copy of the
order to be inserted in the Maryland Gazette
published in the city of Annapolis, three
several weeks before the 10th day of Aug-
ust next, to the intent that the said Gilbert
Buchanan, as the representative of the said
John or Samuel Buchanan, may have notice
of the present application, and of the object
of the bill, and be warned to appear in
court, in person, or by solicitor, on or before
the 10th day of August next, to shew cause
why a conveyance should not be had as pro-
posed.
