MEANS

Of preventing and removing Epileptic Fits. THE following method of preventing and removing epileptic fits, is taken from a magazine published near fifty years ago; the curiosity of it, may lead some persons to make

trial of it, and there is little doubt, that experience will find it useful and beneficial.

Any person subject to the epilepsy, may prevent a fit of it from coming on, if possessed of the least previous notice, before he be entirely deprived of his fenfes, by the following fimple experiment. Let him have always ready in his pocket, a piece of metal, as broad as he is able to contain between his teeth when his jaws are stretched to the utmost; as foon as he feels the first symptom of the fit, let him take this piece of metal immediately and open his teeth as wide as possible, and put it between them, so that his jaws may thereby be kept at their utmost at September term next. stretch for some time; this in about half a minute will reftore him entirely to his fenfes, time.

If the fit should come on before the piece of metal can be obtained, the fame experiment will remove it in a very thort time; for if the instrument, when procured, be placed between the patient's teeth, till his laws are at the utmost stretch, the fit will immediately go off, and the patient very foon

Some years ago at Amsterdam, a number of gentlemen being in company together, one of them was feized with a fit of epilepfy; the other gentlemen present could not help being concerned at the accident; but an old officer how it flies from the supposed disgrace, of the army, who also made one of the com-librinks from contract of the rude embrace pany, without any toncern, took piece of isom folly should for ever shun; metal from his porket and went to the perfon in the epilepfy, placed it between his teeth, and forced them open with it, where-upon the person forthwith recovered. After being feated, the inquiry was, how the officer could fo quickly recover the gentleman in the epilepsy. He told them that he was often obliged to go out at the head of a party, when the enemy happened to be but a small distance from their camp; and that several of their men being liable to the epileply, if any of them happened to be feized with it when they ared as a party they were obliged to leave them behind, where they often fell into the enemy's hands before they recovered; that on this account he had long been in fearch of fomething which might afford instant recovery, and that he had at last fallen upon this method of forcing open the jaws with a piece of metal, which he had

often tried fince, & had never known it to fail. As it is undoubtedly the forcing open of the jaws, and not any virtue in the metal itfelf, which produces this effect, there can be no difference as to the kind of metal used .-A crown piece might answer; but if made of iron or steel for the purpose, it would be more convenient if made of a square or oblong form, of about the thickness of a crown, and of fuch a breadth as to be exactly equal to the widest opening of the jaws. It may be proper also to observe, that one of the edges ought to be thin, that it may the more early enter between the teeth, when they are to be forced open by some other person; for a handle to it, like the handle of a key.
