AN ACT

To alter the thirty-fecond and thirty-feventh And cles of the Conditution and Form of Govern

BE IT ENACTED, by the General Assen. bly of Maryland, That hereafter, upon the death, relignation or removal out of this state, of the governor, it shall not be neces. fary to call a meeting of the legislature tofil the vacancy occasioned thereby, but the first named of the council for the time being, Call qualify and act as governor until the next meeting of the general affembly, at which meeting a governor shall be chosen in the manner heretofore appointed and directed.

And be it enacted, That hereafter 10 go-

vernor shall be capable of holding any other office of profit during the time for which he

Ihall be elected.

And be it enacted, That fo much of the thirty-fecond and thirty-feventh articles of the constitution and form of government asing pugnant to, or inconfistent with, the provifions of this act, be and the fame are hereby, abrogated and abolished.

And be it enacted, That if this act shall be confirmed by the general affembly, after the next election of delegates, in the full feller after fucli new election, as the confliction in form of government directs, that in such cale this act, and the alteration and amendment of the copilitation and form of government therein contained, shall be taken and corf. dered, and shall constitute and be valid, as part of the faid constitution and form of government, any thing therein contained to the contrary notwithstanding.
