Mr. A. Dorsey presented a petition from gotiation with the British minister, and the Francis Goole, of Anne-Arundel county, praying to be supported out of the poors house, a petition from Jasper E. Tilley, of Anne-Arundel county, praying further regulations relative to his ferry, and a petition from Elitha Brown, of Anne-Arundel county, counter to the petition from the heirs of Richard Stringer; Mr. Randall presented a petition from John Welch, and others, of Baltimore county, praying commissioners may review the road through faid Welch's land; and Mr. Baer presented a petition from Daniel Arthur, of Frederick county, praying a divorce; which were read and referred.

question was put, That the following be inferted after the first word " whereas"? to wit: "The free people of Maryland are fully competent to decide for themselves upon a point of executive policy, which concerns their interest in common with their fellow-citizens of the United States: And whereas on fuller information than we here posses, and on a thorough view of the causes and circumstances of an affair, which they are now particularly entitled to know and investigate, the people themselves may be safely trusted to form their own opinion, without any immediate guidance or direction from the state legislature, not acting in the usual course of that authority which is derived folely from the people; therefore Refolved, That this general affembly do not perceive how it is rendered a matter of duty or expediency, or that it is in any manner expected of us by our constituents, that we should, at this period, unnecessarily consume the public time and public money in deliberating and pronouncing a judgment upon the tenor of the late communications between the fecretary of flate and the British minister, which terminated in the dismissal of that minister; but whenever the occasion requires the faithful fervices of the country, as against any foreign power whatever, we already confider ourselves as folemuly and individually pledged to act with promptness, and unite with one accord, in every fair and patriotic effort to fultain the independence and dignity of the American government, and preferve inviolate the rights and honour of the American name ?" Refolved, That our fenators in congress be instructed, and our representatives requested, and they are hereby instructed and requested, to support the government of our country in whatever confequences may flow from the dismissal of Francis J. By the House of Delegates, Dec. 21, 1809. Gentlemen of the Senate, The members of this house, feeling anxious to close the present session of this legislature, and well aware of the heavy expenses of the state attendant upon a protracted feffion, and fully convinced that the alarming fituation of our national affairs demands a careful economy of the public finances, propose, with the concurrence of your house, to meet at five o'clock this evening, for the purpole of figning and fealing the bills already engroffed, and do appoint - to join fuch gentlemen as may be fixed upon by your body to wait upon the governor and to request his attendance in the fenate chamber at the

The bill author fing Joseph M. Ceney, late theriff of Anne-Arundel county, to complete his collection, was read the fecond time, pall-

ed, and fent to the fenate.

Mr. Bowles delivers a bill, entitled, An act relative to the judges of the court of appeals,

and of the county courts; which was read. The report on the petition of John S. Brookes was read the fecond time, the refolution therein contained affented to, and fent to the fenate

The bill to make valid a deed from William D. Glover, to Henrietta Glover, now Henrietta Rich, was read the second time, paffed, and fent to the fenate.

The clerk of the fenate delivers the bill respecting the land records of Saint-Mary's county, the supplement to the act to lay out a certain road in Baltimore county, the bill to authorife and empower the court of appeals to hear and determine the matter of the decree of the late court of appeals, &c. and the bill to authorise a lottery in Frederick-town for the purpole of paving Market-street, in faid town, feverally endorfed, "will pafe." Ordered to be engroffed. The bill to fix and establish Argyle alley in the city of Baltimore, endorfed, "will pals with the propoled amendment ;" which amendment was agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engroffed. And the refolution relative to repairing and furnishing the government-house, endorsed, " asfented to."

The amendments to the Supplement to the of the poor in the leveral counties therein defignated, were agreed to, and the bill ordered to be engroffed.

The bill annulling the marriage of Peregrine Emory and Kitty E. Emory his wife, was read the fecond time, and the question put, Shall the faid bill pals? Refolved in the affirmative, and fent to the fenate.

Mr. Holbrooke appeared in the house. The house refumed the confideration of the bill concerning crimes and punishments, and after making further amendments thereto, and reading the bill throughout, Mr. J. H. Thomas moved the following order.

Ordered, That the bill, entitled, An act concerning crimes and punishments, be referred to the next general affembly of Maryland, and as the bill proposes, at the expense of the flate, to establish the penitentiary-house at Baltimore for a new system of punishments in Maryland, that it be published with the acts of this fellion for the confideration of the people.
