An ACT more effectually to secure the col-

lection of the public revenues. WHEREAS it appears from the statements of the treasurers of the respective shores, that very considerable sums

of money are due to this state, under the several denominations of debts therein specified, and fome of faid debts appear to have been long fince due, and in a very hazardous fituation, and it being at all times not only the duty of the legislature to dicure and protect the public revenue, but also to adopt such measures as may tend more effectually to collest the outstanding debts due to the state, and to bring the same as speedily, and as far as possible, into the treasury; therefore,

Be it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the treasurers of the western and eastern shores respectively, be and they are hereby authorised and required, to order and direct fuit or fuits to be brought immediately against such debtor or debtors for debts due to this state, as they may deem necessary, right and proper, having a reference to the validity thereof, and also to profecute, and to continue to final iffue and determination, all fuch fuit or fuits already brot' and still depending for debts due to the state, as they may think adviseable and proper.

And be it enacted, That if any clerk, sheriff or collector, of any county of this state, shall hereafter refuse or neglect to pay unto the treasurer of the shore to whom the same ought to be paid, any monies of the faid flate in the hands of the faid clerk, sheriff or collector, at the time limitted by law for the payment thereof, and to render and fettle his accounts with the faid treasurer, it shall be, and it is hereby expressly declared to be, the duty of the faid treasurer, within three months thereafter, to order and direct fuit or fuits to be instituted and commenced on the said clerk's, fheriff's and collector's bond respectively, for the recovery of all monies fo due and owing.

And be it enacted, That the treasurer of the western or eastern shore respectively, upon the ordering any fuch fuit or fuits, may appoint any attorney to fuch fuit or fuits, fo directed to be brought, profecuted or continued as aforesaid; provided, that all monies property. to be recovered in faid fuits, shall be paid to the treasurer of the western or eastern shore, and to no other person or persons whatsoever

And be it enacted, That if any clerk of any county court, upon whose bond judgment shall be entered as aforefaid, and execution shall be issued, shall not pay the monies due thereon to the respective treasurer for two fuccessive terms to which faid execution shall be returnable, such default shall be, and the same is hereby declared to be, misbehaviour in office within the meaning of the constitution, and shall be prosecuted as such; and it shall be the duty of the respective county courts to give the fame in charge to the grand jury of their counties respectively.

And be it enacted, That a statement of the proceedings of the faid treasurers respectively, in pursuance of this act, be annually laid before the legislature. 2

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorised and empowered, in all cases of debts due to this thate, where judgments have been obtained and the defendants are subject to execution, upon application being made to them, and being fully fatisfied that the faid debt, for which an indulgence is prayed for, is well and fufficiently fecured, and upon fuch applicant paying all the interest due thereon, to thay any further proceedings against such debtor until the meeting of the next general affembly; provided that any judgment, upon which proceedings may be stayed as aforesaid, shall continue and remain in full force, and execution may be iffued thereon at any time after the expiration of fuch stay.

Notice to State Debtors.

HE treasurer of the western shore, flate of Maryland, requelts all debtors to the state to discharge their respective balances. which are payable into the treasury of the western shore, on or before the twentieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ten ; immed ately thereafter all lawful me ins will be taken to enforce payment, and all penalties incurred by the clerks, therifis and collectors, on the western shore, will be exaed. This notice, it is hoped, will be attended to, it will fave the debtors a confiderable expenfe, and the officer the difagreeable task of enforcing the collection. A PROCLAMATION. W HEREAS it has been represented to me, by the memorial of Jacob Staley, of Frederick county, that on the night of the fixteenth of December last, his new barn, with the following contents, was fet on fire and confumed, viz. In wheat and other finall grain, about fourteen hundred bufhels, two tun of hay, fix head of valuable horses, and nine head of horned cattle; and that on the night of the twenty-fifth of October last, another barn belonging to the faid Staley, with he following contents, viz. about eight hundred bushels of wheat, fif.een tun of hay, and fodder to a confiderable amount, was likewife confumed by fire, and that he has reafon to suspect that some malicious person or persons wilfully set fire to the same: And whereas it is of the greatest importance to fociety, that the perpetrators of such crimes should be discovered and brought to justice, I have therefore thought proper to iffue this my proclamation, and do, by and with the advice and confent of the Council, offer a reward of FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS to whoever will difcover the author or per-petrators of the faid offerces, provided he, the, or they, or a y of them, be convicted thereof; and moreover. I do, by virtue of the authority and power vefted in me, hereby promise a full and free pardon to any persons being an accomplice, who shall discover the perpetrator or perpetrators of the faid offences, on the aforefaid condition.
