From the London Morning Chronicle, March 7.

"IT is very currently reported, that the Negotiations which have for sometime been conducted by the Marquis Wellesley and Mr. Pinkney, has happily terminated in an amicable adjustment of the differences between this country and the United States of America. The John Adams frigate has been detained to carry out the Treaty, which will not be made public until the ratifications are exchanged. It is said that the dispatches of the American Minister are to be forwarded to the Frigate to-morrow."

Late from Spain.

From a London paper of March 3.

By the Monticello which has arrived from Cadiz, after the short voyage of 10 days, we have let ers and papers to the 23d ult. The force of Victor, to whom the siege of that fortress was committed, amounted to 30,000 men. Some distant fighting had taken place, but attended with no important consequences. It was apprehended that there would not be that perfect harmony between the Portuguese and Spanish troops in Cadiz which was so desirable under the present circumstances, when the common safety required, that as friends and allies, they should suppress all their reciprocal antipathies. The Myrtle drop of war, with 550,000 dolls. had failed for Lisbon.

Letters from Madeira, per the Helen, capt. McCobb, arrived at Alexandria, state, that wine had risen to 56l. sterling per pipe, in consequence of the short vintage of last year and the great demand for English account.

Extract of a letter from Paris.

"It is now ascertained that the sister of the emperor Alexander is the princess who is to become the wife of the emperor Napoleon. Caulincourt, a relation of the ambassador of that name, at St. Petersburg, left Paris a few days ago for that capital, to escort the Russian princess to this city, where the nuptial ceremonies are to be celebrated. Other important marriages are also expected to take place on the same occasion.

"Under these circumstances it is not thought that Napoleon will depart for Spain till the latter end of March, or, perhaps, the middle of April, and that he will then have only to congratulate his armies on the ceasing from all their labors; for the troops in that country are expected to strike a decisive blow long before that time arrives. It is announced to their great satisfaction, that no conscription will be wanted this year; from which we infer that the government considers the troops already under arms as sufficiently numerous for every purpose for which they may be required."

Massachusetts Election.

Returns from 398 towns—Gerry 44,501—Gore 42,463.

Col. Monroe, late minister at London, was elected a member of the state legislature, from Albemarle county, (Vir.) on the second inst.

Col. Burr was reported to be at Paris at the last dates, where he had suggested a plan for the dismemberment of the U. S. in the event of a rupture between the two countries. [Boston paper.]

The directors of the Farmers and Merchants Bank, have elected William Grahame, Esq. President, and John Duer, Esq. Cashier.

Hezekiah Waters, Esq. has been appointed President, and James Law, Esq. Cashier, of the Marine Bank of Baltimore.

Portsmouth, (England.) Feb. 10.

On Thursday arrived here the famous French frigate Cannonier, of 44 guns, prize to the Valiant, capt. Bligh. The accounts differ very much as to the value of her cargo—she having been stated to have been laden with the spoils of her depredations in the Indian sea. Capt. Bligh, in his official letter, says, "she is laden with a cargo of colonial produce." Another account states her cargo to consist of sugar, Mocha and other coffee, cotton, indigo, cloves, nutmegs, ebony, tea, pepper, gum Arabic, tortoise shell, cinnamon, nankeens, galls, bark silk, ivory, ginger and India goods, to the value of 150,000 pounds sterling. A later paper says, "she is said to have beside produce, 32 tons of silver, in specie and bullion, and she has been ordered into the river to unload."

The Knell.

Departed this life, on Sunday morning last, in this city, Mr. NATHAN JARVIS, printer, in the 59th year of his age.

At Sandy-Hill, (S. C.) on the 16th ultimo, terminated the existence of general William Washington, and added the name of that gallant veteran to the melancholy list of deceased American worthies.

ORDERED, That the bill, entitled, An act respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts, be published once in each week, for the space of six weeks, in the Maryland Gazette and Maryland Republican at Annapolis, and the Star at Easton.

An additional Supplement to the act, entitled, An act respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts.

BE it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the several county courts of this state may exercise concurrent jurisdiction in all cases in the same manner that they now exercise jurisdiction by virtue of the act to which this is a supplement.

And be it enacted, That each of the judges of the several districts of this state, during vacation, shall have full power and authority to exercise, in their judicial districts, all the powers which the chancellor of this state can or may exercise.

And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of one of the associate judges of the several judicial districts of this state to attend at the court-house of the several counties in their judicial district, at some day between the several sessions of their court, who shall have power to make all necessary orders touching any subject matter in the said respective courts, upon the equity side, brought or depending therein, and it shall be the duty of the several clerks of the several counties in this state to attend the said judge on the said days, who shall make due entry of all such matters and things as shall or may be ordered as aforesaid by the said judge; and the several county courts in this state are hereby instructed, at their first court next after the passage of this act, to appoint the several days on which the said judge shall attend as aforesaid.

And be it enacted, That the county courts shall have full power and authority to appoint an auditor to the said court.

And be it enacted, That all and every person or persons who shall or may think themselves to be aggrieved by the decree of any county court, in any case of which such county court may have an equity jurisdiction by virtue of this act shall be at liberty, in all cases to appeal to the court of appeals of the respective shires, and in the same manner, and under the same circumstances, and such appeals shall have the same legal effect and consequences as appeals prosecuted from the court of chancery to the court of appeals.

And be it enacted, That the clerks of the several county courts in this state shall act as registers for their said counties, in the same manner as the register in chancery now does.
