" IT is very currently reported, that the Negotiations which have for fometime been conducted by the Marquis Wellesley and Mr. Pinkney, has happily terminated in an amicable adjustment of the differences between this country and the United States of America. The John Adams frigate has been detained to carry out the Treaty, which will not be mide public until the ratifications are exchanged. It is faid that the dispatches of the American Minister are to be forwarded to the Frigate to-morrow."

It was apprehended that there would not be that perfect harmony between the Portuguele and Spanish troops in Cadiz which was fo desirable under the present circumstances, when the common fafety required, that as friends and allies, they should suppress all thier reciprocal antipathies. The Myrtle sloop of war, with \$50,000 dolls. had failed for Lifbon.

Letters from Madeira, per the Helen, capt. M'Cobb, arrived at Alexandria, flate, that wine had rifen to 561. Sterling per pipe, in consequence of the short vintage of last year and the greated emand for English account.

Extract of a letter from Paris.

"It is now ascertained that the fister of the emperor Alexander is the princess who is to become the wife of the emperor Nupoleon. Caulincourt, a relation of the ambassador of that name, at St. Petersburg, left Paris a few days ago for that capital, to escort the Rusfian princels to this city, where the nuptial teremonies are to be celebrated. Other important marriages are also expected to take place on the fame occasion.

"Under these circumstances it is not thought that Napoleon will depart for Spain till the latter end of March, or, perhaps, the middle of April, and that he will then have only to congratulate his armies on the ceasing from all their labour; for the troops in that countrya e expected to firike a decifive blow long before that time arrives. It is announced to their great fatisfaction, that no confcription will be wanted this year; from which we infer that the government confiders the troops already under arms as fufficiently numerous fo every purpose for which they may be required."

Bligh, in his official letter, faye, " she is laden with a cargo of colonial produce." An additional Supplement to the act, entitled, An act respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts.

BE it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the feveral county courts of this state may exercise concurrent jurisdiction in all cases in the same manner that they now exercise jurisdiction by virtue of the act

to which this is a supplement.

And be it enacted, That each of the judges. of the feveral difficts of this flate, during vacation, shall have full power and authority to exercife, in their judicial diftricts, all the powers which the chancellor of this state can

r may exercife. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of one of the affociate judges of the feveral judicial districts of this state to attend at the court-house of the several counties in their judicial diffrict, at some day between the feveral fessions of their court, who shall have power to make all necessary orders touching any subject matter in the said respective courts, upon the equity fide, brought or depending therein, and it shall be the duty of the feveral clerks of the feveral counties in this flate to attend the faid judge on the faid days, who shall make due entry of all such matters and things as shall or may be ordered as aforefaid by the faid judge; and the feveral county courts in this flate are hereby inftructed, at their first court next after the passage of this act, to app int the feveral days on which the faid judge Mall attend as aforefaid.

And be it enacted, That the county courts tha I have full power and authority to appoint an auditor to the faid court.

And be it enacted, That all and every per-Out or perfors who shall or may think themf-tves to be aggrieved by the decree of any county court, in any case of which such ty court may have an equity ju fdiction by virtue of this act shall be at liberty, in all cases to appeal to the court of appeals of the respective shore, and in the same manner, and under the same circumstances, and such appeals shall have the same legal effect and consequences as appeals prosecuted from the court of chancery to the court of appeals.

And be it enacted, That the clerks of the feveral county courts in this flate thall act as registers for their faid counties, in the fame manner as the register in chancery now does.
