By the fall failing ship Plato, capt. Harris, which has arrived at Salem, from Tonningen, 1143 days-the following copy of a new detree issued by the Danish government has been received. Vessels which arrived after is date were not allowed to break bulk, and apivateer was stationed to give notice. No feires; but apprehentions kept the markets doen. The Danish government was believed friendly, but could not relift the wifhes of higher powers, to whom we are indebted for all favours of this kind.

THE DECREE In order to prevent all funggling trade to be apprehended by the abuse of the American Fag, between the Island of Heligoland, ocespied by the enemy, and the neighbouring orts of Tonning and Husum, His Majesty be King has been pleased to order :-

That from the time this present royal orer shall be published and made known at Tonning and Husum, and until further orders, no ship bearing the American flag, shall be permitted to enter in faid ports and difcharge their cargoes there, but fuch thips hall be ordered away without breaking bulk. This royal order is herewith made known

A letter from Salem mentions that the araval from Tonningen brings intelligence that the blockade of Gottenburg had been raifed by the British, and the American vessels were mlonger restrained from entering the Baltic.

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The conduct of the Danes in giving our vifels notice not to enter the ports of Tonbogen and Hussum is much more fair than that of Buonaparte in fuffering our veffels to enter ports under his control, and then consecating them. The Americans had no Wainings off Holland, at Antwerp, at St. Schaffians, and they were indeed invited at

Accounts have this day reached us, that a sequestration of American property has taken place at Stralfund, Stettin and Konigfburg, by the new French conful appointed tt that district. All the Salem vessels were h fortunate as to escape the iron grasp, extept capt. H. Flint, who was at Strallund. It has excited confiderable alarm among those tho are in Hollicin; and the tardy and un-tertain manner which business is done, makes every one a issuation truly painful. I here had an unpfinal share of trouble and difculty t my goods have been fold and twice Eturned on my hands.

There is to be a change in the civil and amirary establishments here. The Hamburg beops are to be disbanded, except 20, and land Gazette. Price I dolls 50 cts.

French troops are to do the duty. There has lately been a renewal of the oldidemand, by the French, which has never been paid, of 1,800,000 mares baneo per annum."

It was said at Hamburg; June 21, that the American property at Konigsburg, Stet-tin and Strassound, was sequestrated; but a passenger says, that the intention being known some days beforehand, most of the property was got of.

The passengers in the Plato report that all American vessels at Stettin were sequestrated. A Newport Thip at Stralfund, and about 30,000 dollars value of the cargo of the ship Mount Vernon, of Salem, were fegnestrat ed. The cargo was on shore, had been fold, but was returned oh Captain Flint's hands.

No account of any seizure or sequestration at Konigsburg, but it was reported they would not be allowed to fell there.

The Danish government was believed friendly to American commerce, but could not refift the wishes of higher powers. The warning American vessels not to enter port (which prevents the rifk of feizure and fequestration) was considered the best service the king could perform.

A: Hamburg were only about 20 city troops; a body of French were to march in, as is frequent, to squeeze out a new contribution of cloathing, &c.
