

**NEW-ORLEANS, JULY 19.**  
The United States brig Vixen is in the river, one of her boats came up to this city last evening.

Dead, at sea, on his passage from the Havana to this port, lieut. Tripper, of the U. S. navy. He had the command of the Vixen, and was ordered (as we are informed) to cruise in our waters for the protection of our trade. Lieut. Trippe was a brave active officer, and had signalized himself in the Tripolitan war, in the Mediterranean.

All the information we have received from West-Florida, corroborates the extract of a letter which we published yesterday, from Baton Rouge. Deputies have been named at Baton Rouge, who are gone up to join the general convention or congress at Buller's Plains. It is generally understood that the governor of Baton Rouge is favourable to the views of the people. We also find that the people continue to place much dependence on the United States for their protection, at least that part of Florida which has been claimed by them.

**BOSTON, AUGUST 10.  
FROM TONNINGEN.**

By the last sailing ship Plato, capt. Harris, which has arrived at Salem, from Tonnigen, in 43 days—the following copy of a new decree issued by the Danish government has been received. Vessels which arrived after its date were not allowed to break bulk, and a privateer was stationed to give notice. No seizures; but apprehensions kept the markets down. The Danish government was believed friendly, but could not resist the wishes of higher powers, to whom we are indebted for all favours of this kind.

**THE DEGREE.**

In order to prevent all smuggling trade to be apprehended by the abuse of the American flag, between the Island of Heligoland, occupied by the enemy, and the neighbouring ports of Tonnigen and Husum, His Majesty the King has been pleased to order:—

That from the time this present royal order shall be published and made known at Tonnigen and Husum, and until further orders, no ship bearing the American flag, shall be permitted to enter in said ports and discharge their cargoes there, but such ships shall be ordered away without breaking bulk. This royal order is herewith made known to all whom it may concern, for due observance of the same.

Extract of a letter from Stralsund, June 12.  
"All foreign and American property in Swedish Pomerania has been sequestered. This measure took place immediately after the arrival of French consuls, who gave to the Swedes the alternative of sequestration or a French army.

"Fortunately the amount of American property caught was not considerable, as most of it had been previously sold and delivered."

Letters from Stralsund, of June 19, state that all American property in that place, as well as Konigsburg and Stettin, have been put under sequestration. American vessels, that could, were quitting all the ports of Swedish Pomerania.

A letter from Salem mentions that the arrival from Tonnigen brings intelligence that the blockade of Gottenburg had been raised by the British, and the American vessels were no longer restrained from entering the Baltic.

The conduct of the Danes in giving our vessels notice not to enter the ports of Tonnigen and Husum is much more fair than that of Buonaparte in suffering our vessels to enter ports under his control, and then confiscating them. The Americans had no warnings off Holland, at Antwerp, at St. Sebastian, and they were indeed invited at Naples!

**SALEM, AUGUST 10.**

Extract of a letter from a gentleman at Hamburg to his friend in Salem, dated June 19.

"Accounts have this day reached us, that a sequestration of American property has taken place at Stralsund, Stettin and Konigsburg, by the new French consul appointed at that district. All the Salem vessels were fortunate as to escape the iron grasp, except capt. H. Flint, who was at Stralsund. It has excited considerable alarm among those who are in Holland; and the tardy and uncertain manner in which business is done, makes every one's situation truly painful. I have had an unusual share of trouble and difficulty: my goods have been sold and twice returned on my hands.

There is to be a change in the civil and military establishments here. The Hamburg troops are to be disbanded, except 20; and

French troops are to do the duty. There has lately been a renewal of the old demand, by the French, which has never been paid, of 1,800,000 marks banco per annum."

It was said at Hamburg, June 21, that the American property at Konigsburg, Stettin and Stralsund, was sequestered; but a passenger says, that the intention being known some days beforehand, most of the property was got off.

The passengers in the Plato report that all American vessels at Stettin were sequestered. A Newport ship at Stralsund, and about 30,000 dollars value of the cargo of the ship Mount Vernon, of Salem, were sequestered. The cargo was on shore, had been sold, but was returned on Captain Flint's hands.

No account of any seizure or sequestration at Konigsburg, but it was reported they would not be allowed to sell there.

The Danish government was believed friendly to American commerce, but could not resist the wishes of higher powers. The warning American vessels not to enter port (which prevents the risk of seizure and sequestration) was considered the best service the king could perform.

A: Hamburg were only about 20 city troops; a body of French were to march in, as is frequent, to squeeze out a new contribution of cloathing, &c.

**NORFOLK, AUGUST 10.**

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Gottenburg, dated the 7th June, to a merchant house in this place, received by the Caledonian, captain Nash.

"I follow the Caledonian, who is under way, and going out, in order to inform you that all American property will be sequestered in Swedish Pomerania, by order of the French government. Notice has been given at Stralsund that this order would be carried into execution in ten days."
