BATTLE IN PORTUGAL.
Letters in town state that a great battle has been fought in Portugal; in which Lord Wellington was killed. This is not official, and we hope will prove unfounded. [The issue is from the "Statesman" of July 28; "Courier," of the same evening, denies the reception of any letters giving this information.]

The Turks have been defeated in a late battle; and it is now expected they will make peace, by surrendering the Provinces of Moldavia & Wallachia.

King Louis is with Jerome at Cassel. The queen of Holland is forbid to visit him; and has imagined she is to be poisoned, and has gone to Piombiers.

Spanish wool dull sale at reduced prices. Two years consumption on hand. Bonaparte has new modified the laws of Holland respecting Commerce; every fishing boat must have a French soldier on board. He was expected at Amsterdam to visit the Emperor.

A large American ship in ballast was cut off at a port in the Baltic, and has arrived in England. A fleet of forty two sail of British merchantmen have been captured off the Naze of Norway by the enemy's gun-boats.

WASHINGTON, SEPT. 7.
The recall of Mr. Jackson has been announced to our government in a letter from the Britannic Majesty to the President of the United States.

The appointment of Mr. Morier, as his Britannic Majesty's Secretary of Legation to the United States, has been announced in a letter from Lord Wellesley to Mr. Secretary Smith, with the further information that Mr. Morier would act in the character of his Majesty's Charge des Affaires until the appointment of Mr. Jackson's successor. In the recall of Mr. Jackson by the British government will be found a compliance with the request made by the Executive of the United States through our minister in London, and it is true, longer than was necessary; and so far unsatisfactory; but yet such compliance as has saved the administration from the disagreeable alternative of ordering Mr. Jackson out of the country, which course, had his recall been refused, would have been effected by the usage of nations. Contemporaneous with the recall is an official announcement that a successor will be appointed, and that Mr. Morier will act as Charge des Affaires until the successor shall arrive.

It will be remarked, that in the manner in which Mr. Jackson has been recalled, the feelings of the American government appear to have been respected, in as much as the recall is not pronounced as in ordinary cases, in the name of Mr. Erskine for instance through the minister himself, but directly from the sovereign. In the manner of Mr. Morier's introduction to the Executive, also, a desire in

is discovered to avoid the dilemma which must have resulted from the announcement of Mr. Morier's appointment, as Charge des Affaires, in the usual mode, through the recalled minister. Had the British government been disposed to aggravate existing differences, it would have been left to Mr. Jackson to announce the appointment of Mr. Morier as Charge des Affaires; and, as the Executive has refused to receive any further communication from Mr. Jackson, the introduction of Mr. Morier as the Representative of the British government could not have been received through that medium.

These circumstances, though indicative of a disposition to avoid irritation, amount to but little. Should the British government unreasonably delay the appointment of a successor to Mr. Jackson, it would give just ground to suspect an intention to procrastinate that atonement & those explanations already too long delayed; and would warrant the belief that the new minister's nomination was delayed with a view of being guided by subsequent events in the selection of a successor, or in the instructions with which he is to be furnished.

END OF THE DUTCH NATION.
The English papers contain the Decree of Napoleon annexing Holland to the French Empire. It is dated July 9. It provides, that Amsterdam shall be the third city of the Empire. Holland to have 6 Senators, 6 Deputies to the Council of State, 25 Deputies to the Legislative Body, and two Judges in the Court of Cassation. All offices to continue. The Duke of Placentia to be Lt. General. The Colonial produce now in Holland to remain in the hands of the owners, upon paying a duty of 50 percent. Said merchandise upon payment of the duties may be imported into France.

The Dutch have already experienced a sample of the mild and paternal Government of Napoleon! Its first act has been to issue a Proclamation, by which every soldier quartered in Amsterdam is authorized to demand of the person upon whom he is billeted, a daily allowance of a gill of Geneva, 24 ounces of bread, two ounces of greens, eight ounces of meat, and a pot of beer. There is not one word about payment to the poor Dutchmen.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.
By the several ships arrived at Boston, New-York and Philadelphia, we have London accounts to the 28th of July; Lisbon to 25th. No battle had been fought in Portugal—the Russians had beaten the Turks back to Adrianople—the government of Holland is no more—losses and complaints in Ireland and Great-Britain—the Westphalian troops refuse to march to Spain; on which Jerome ordered out all conscripts including boys above 14—queen of Holland died suddenly—the Danes will not now suffer any American ships to go to the Island of Sylt, nor to any port on the west coast of Holstein, Schleswick and Jutland, to unload. A total exclusion of the Americans is daily apprehended. [Fed. Gazette.]

HISTORY OF PRINTING.
