#### CHARITABLE SOCIETY OF THE CITY OF ANNAPOLIS.

Board of Managers-Messieurs Samuel Edout, John T. Barber, Nicholas Brewer, Joseph Evans, John Randall, John Golder, demiah Hughes and Nicholas J. Watkins. RULES OF THE SOCIETY.

THE officers of this Society shall be a President, Secretary, Treasurer and Board of Managers. There shall be eight managers, and the president of the Soc sy shall be ex officio president of the Board.

2 In case of a vacancy in the board of mapagers, they shall, at their next meeting, theft a person to supply it; and an appointment, fo made, thall continue until the next meeting of the Society.

Four managers, with the prefident, or, in his absence, five managers, shall be quo-rum, & competent to transact any bunnels committed to them-Any smaller number. to be agreed upon by the Board, shall be authorised to execute their resolves.

When the president is absent at any meeting of the board of managers, or in case of a vacancy in that office from whatever cause, the managers shall appoint a chairman, who shall have and execute, pro tempore, the powers of the president. Whenever by death, refigurion, or other-

vife, a vacancy shall happen in either of the offices of President, Treasurer or Setretary, the board of managers shall fix a day for the meeting of the Society, in order to make a new appointment, and shall give due notice thereof. Until the meeting thall have taken place they are authofiled to appoint, pro tempore, a person to the office, who shall possess all the powers and discharge the duties of the office.

All elections siall be made by ballot. 7. The fecretary shall keep in a book provided for the purpose, the names of all the members of the Society, and is the ame book shall record its proceedings, and such of the purpose. of the proceedings of the board and managert, as may be directed by them to be re-

d. The treasurer shall receive the contributions of the members, and such other contributions in money as the charitable may be disposed to make to the Society. He shall Pay the ordern of the board of managers which orders shall be signed by the President, or in case of his absence, or a vacancy in the office, by the Chairman appointed in the minner lerein belord provided. He stall make a report at each regular meeting of the Society, of his receipts and disburfes vern.

ments and when required by the board of Extract of a letter from a gentleman in the managers, shall give to them information with respect to the funds of the Society.

9. It shall be the duty of the board of mas magers to provide, as far as the funds of the Society will enable them, for the relief and comfort of the poor of the City of Annapolis, and to adopt fuch rules as may be found expedient in order to ensure a faithful application of the funds of the Society, to the purpoles of its institution. They shall receive and dispose of all contributions, not in money, which shall be offered to the Society.

O. Under the direction of the board of managers there shall be opened a Soup House. The soup to be distributed to the poor in such quantities as the Mana-gers, figned by the President. shall also be prepared lickets for sale, and authorifing the holders of them to receive, for the time limited in them, a certain quantity of foup. The price of faid tickets to be fixed by the managers, and the funds ariling from the sale of them to be applied as the other funds of the Socie-

1. For as much as to provide for the relief and comfort of the indigent is the defire of this Society, and nothing can contribute thereto, in a greater degree, than holding out inducements to labour, it shall be a part of the duty of the hoard of managers to receive and depolit, in some pro-per place, for sale, articles, the produce of the labour and exertion of the poor, & to purchase raw materials to be wrought up by them, for which they are to be paid out of the proceeds of the fale; and it is earnestly recommended to the charitable and humane to fupply themselves, out of the same, with the articles of which they may be in want, when there to be had.

2. The primary object of this Society is to fupply the wants of the poor in cloathing, fuel and victuals, but an additional inducement to this affociation is to encourage them to industry and qualify them to become valuable members of Society, and to this end to provide for their instruction in the rudements of uteful knowledge. Whenever therefore the funds of the Society in its oping will authorife it, a School shall be established for the education of those children, who without aid from the benevolent, have not the means of obtaining such instruction, and into which shall be admitted others, upon the payment of fuch fums by their parents or guardians, as it shall be thought that they can afford to pay. And in order to obviate the evils which might arise from a knowledge, by the instructor of the scholars who are taught gratis, no person shall be admitted into the school without a ticket from the board of managers, directing them to be received, and the managers are enjoined not to make it known upon what terms the faid tickets were obtained.

13. In affociating for the purpole of fuccoring indigence, the Society feel it be their duty not to lessen the motives to must try and exertion, and to discountenance, as far as it possesses the power every species of vice. The funds of the Society shall not therefore be burthened with the fupport of any person able to work, who shall be known to refuse employment upon reasonable terms, or to have employed what it receives from the funds of this Society in the procuring of the means of intoxication, or in any other vicious indulgence. When known, the person guilty of fuch conduct shall receive no further aid, and the tickets which they may have obtained shall be forseited, until in the opinion of the board of managers, a reformation has taken place, and except in cases

of the most imperious necessity, 4. The regular meeting of the Society shall be holden on the first Saturday in January and July, and the members present at any meeting shall be a quorum for the transacting of any bulinels of the Society .-The Board of managers to have the power to call a meeting whenever they think
