They give no more than they dare not withhold; they abfain from nothing but what they must not practice. When you state to them the doubtful quality of an action, and the confequent obligation to defift from it, they reply to you in the very spirit of Shylock, "they cannot find it in the bond." In flort, they know Christianity only as a system of restraints. She is despoiled of every liberal and generous principle; she is rendered almost unfit for the focial intercourses of life, and is only suited to the gloomy walls of that cloitter, in which they would confine her. But true Christians confider themselves not as satisfying fome rigorous creditor, but as discharging a debt of gratitude. Theirs is accordingly not the flinted return of a constrained obedience, but the large and liberal measure of a vo-luntary service. This principle, therefore, as was formerly remarked, and as has been recently observed of true Christian humility, prevents a thousand practical embarrassments, by which they are continually haraffed, who act from a less generous motive; and who require it to be clearly ascertained to them, that any gratification or worldly compliance, which may be in question, is beyond the allowed boundary line of Christian practice. [Wilberforce.]

Let true Christians then, with becoming earnestness, strive in all things to recommend their profession, and to put to filence the vair feeffs of ignorant objectors. Let them bold-ly affert the cause of Christ in an age when so many, who bear the name of Christians, are ashamed of Him; and let them consider as devolved on them the important duty of fuspending for a while the fall of their country, and, perhaps, of performing a still more extensive service to society at large; not by busy interference in politics, in which it can not but be confessed there is much uncertainty; but rather by that fure and radical benefit of restoring the influence of religion, and of raising the standard of morality.

Let them be active, useful, generous to-wards others; manifestly moderate and self-denying in themselves. Let them be assumed of idleness, as they would be of the most acknowledged sin. When Providence blesses them with affluence, let them withdraw from the competition of vanity; and, without fordidness or abfurdity, shew by their modes! demeasour, and by their retiring from display that, without affecting fingularity, they are not flaves to fathion; that they consider in as their duty to fet an example of moderatio and fobriety, and to referve for nobler and more difinterested purposes, that money, which others felfiftly waste in parade, and drefs, and equipage. Let them evince, in short, a manifest moderation in all temporal things; as becomes those shole, affections are fet on higher objects than any which this world affords, and who possess within their own bosoms, a fund of satisfaction and comfort, which the world feeks in vanity and difsipation. Let them cultivate a catholic spirit of universal good will, and of amicable fellowship towards all those, of whatever seet or denomination, who, differing from them in non-essentials, agree with them in the grand fundamentals of religion. Let them, countenance men of real piety whereever they are found; and encourage in others every attempt to repress the progress of vice, and to revive and diffuse the influence of religion and virtue. Let their earnest prayers be constantly offered, that such endeavours may be successful, and that the abused longfuffering of God may still continue to us the invaluable privilege of vital Christianity.

Let them pray continually for their counry in this feafon of national difficulty. We bear upon us but too plainly the marks of a declining empire. Who can fay but that the Governor of the universe, who declares him felf to be a God who hears the prayers of his fervants, may in answer to their intercessions, for a while avert our ruin, and continue to us the fulnels of those temporal bleffings, which in such abundant measure we have hitherto enjoyed. Men of the world, indeed, however they may admit the natural operation of natural causes, and may therefore confess the effects of Religion and morality in promoting the well being of the community; may yet, according to their humour, with a fuile of complacent pity, or a fneer of fupercilious contempt, read of the fervice which real Christians may render to their country, by conciliating the favour and calling down the bleffing of Providence. It may appear in their eyes an instance of the same Superstitious weakness, as that which prompts the terrified inhabitant of Sicily to bring forth the image of his tutelar faint, in order to stop the destructive ravages of Etna. We are however, fure if we believe the fcripture, that God will be disposed to favour the nation to which his fervants belong; and that, in fact, such as they, have often been the unknown, and unhonoured instruments of drawing down on their country the bleffings of fafety and prosperity.
