SERVILE, and base and mercenary, is the notion of Christian practice among the bulk of nominal Christians. They give no more than they dare not withhold; they abstain from nothing but what they must not practice. When you flate to them the doubt-ful quality of an action, and the confequent obligation to defift from it, they reply to you in the very fpirit of Shylock, "they cannot find it in the bond." In thort, they know Christianity only as a system of refraints. She is despoiled of every liberal and generous principle; the is rendered almost unfit for the focial intercourfes of life, and is only fuited to the gloomy walls of that cloiller, in which they would confine her. But true Christians confider themselves not as satisfying some rigorous creditor, but as discharging a debt of gratitude. Theirs is accordingly not the flinted return of a constrained obedience, but the large and Borral measure of a voluntary fervice. This principle, therefore, as was formerly remarked, and as has been recently observed of true Christian humility, prevents a thouland practical embarraffments, by which they are continually harnfied, who act from a less generous motive: and who require it to be clearly ascertained to them, that any gratification or worldly compliance, which may be in question, is beyond the allowed boundary line of Christian practice.

Let true Christians then, with becoming earnestness, strive in all things to recommend their profession, and to put to stency the vain fooffs of ignorant objectors. Let them boldly affert the cause of Christ in an age when so many, who bear the name of Christians, are assamed of Him; and let them consider as devolved on them the important duty of fulpending for a while the fall of their country, and, perhaps, of performing a still more extensive service to society at large; not by busy interference in politics, in which it can-not but be confessed there is much uncertainty; but rather by that fure and radical benefit of restoring the influence of religion, and of railing the standard of morality.

Let them be active, useful, generous to

wards others; manifeltly moderate and felfdenying in themselves. Let them be assumed of idleness, as they would be of the most ac-knowledged sin. When Providence blosses them with affluence, let them withdraw from the competition of vanity; and, without for-didners or abfurdity, fliew by their modest demeanour, and by their retiring from display, that, without affecting fingularity, they are not flaves to fathion; that they confider it as their duty to fet an example of moderation and fobriety, and to referve for nobler and and tobriety, and to referve for nobler and more difiniterested purposes, that money, which others telssifily waste in parade, and drets, and equipage. Let them evince, in short, a manifest moderation in all temporal things; as becomes those whole affections are fet on higher objects than any which this world affords, and who possess within their own bostoms, a fund of satisfaction and com-fort, which the world seeks in vanity and dissipation. Let them cultivate a catholic spirit of univerfal good will, and of amicable fellowship towards all those, of whatever sect or denomination, who, differing from them in non-effentials, agree with them in the grand fundamentals of religion. Let them countenance men of real piety whereever they are found; and encourage in others e very attempt to repress the progress of vice, and to revive and diffuse the influence of religion and virtue. Let their earnest prayers be constantly offered, that such endeavours may be successful, and that the abused longfuffering of God may still continue to us the invaluable privilege of vital Christianity.

Let them pray continually for their country in this season of national difficulty. We bear upon us but too plainly the marks of a declining empire. Who can fay but that the Governor of the universe, who declares him felf to be a God who hears the prayers of his fervants, may in answer to their intercefficus, for a while avert our ruin, and continue to us the fulness of those temporal bleilings. which in fuch abundant measure we have hitherto enjoyed. Men of the world, indeed, however they may admit the natural operation of natural causes, and may therefore confess the effects of Religion and morality in promoting the well being of the community; may yet, according to their humour, with a finile of complacent pity, or a fueer of fupercilious contempt, read of the fervice which real Christians may render to their country, by conciliating the favour and calling down the blefling of Providence. It may appear in their eyes an instance of the same superstitious weakness, as that which prompts the terrified inhabitant of Sicily to bring forth the image of his tutelar faint, in order to ftop the destructive ravages of Etna. We are however, fure if we believe the scrip-ture, that God will be disposed to favour the nation to which his fervants belong; and that, in fact, fuch as they, have often been the unknown, and unhonoured instruments of drawing down on their country the bleffings of fafety and profperity.
