The President and Directors may call a general meeting of the Stockholders for any purpose relative to the Institution, giving at least three weeks notice in two or more newspapers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in the city of Annapolis, one in Georgetown, one in Fredericktown, one in Hagarstown, and one in Easton. Any number of Stockholders not less than fifty, who together shall be proprietors of not less than one thousand shares, may, at any time apply to the President and Directors, to call a general meeting of the Stockholders, for any purpose relative to the Institution, and if the President and Directors shall refuse to call such meeting, the said number of Stockholders, proprietors of not less than the aforesaid number of shares, shall have power to call a general meeting of the Stockholders, giving at least sixty days notice in two or more newspapers printed in the city of Baltimore, one in the city of Annapolis, one in Georgetown, one in Fredericktown, one in Hagarstown, and one in Easton, and specifying in such notice, the object or objects of such meeting.

The dividends of the profits of the corporation, or of such of the said profits as shall be deemed expedient and proper, shall be declared half yearly during the months of August and March, and be paid in the months of September and April in every year, and shall from time to time be determined by a majority of the Directors at a meeting to be held for that purpose, and shall in no case exceed the amount of the net profits actually acquired by the corporation, so that the capital stock of the corporation shall never be impaired by dividends; and at the expiration of every three years a dividend of surplus profits shall be made; but the Directors shall then be at liberty to retain at least one per cent upon the capital for the time being as a fund for future contingencies. It shall be the duty of the Cashier to cause a correct statement of all surplus profits remaining in the Bank, not divided among the Stockholders antecedent to each annual election, to be made out and kept in the Bank for the inspection of Stockholders, between the times of such dividends being declared and each annual election.

If the Directors shall at any time willfully and knowingly make or declare any dividend which shall impair the capital stock, all the Directors present at the making or declaring such dividend and consenting thereto, shall be liable in their individual capacities to the corporation for the amount or proportion of the said capital stock so divided by the Directors; and each Director who shall be present at the making or declaring of such dividend, shall be deemed to have consented thereto, unless he shall immediately enter his dissent in writing, on the minutes of the proceedings of the Board, or give public notice to the Stockholders that such dividend has been declared.

The shares of stock shall be transferable on the books of the Bank only according to such rules as shall be established by the President and Directors, but all debts actually due and payable to the Bank by a Stockholder requiring a transfer, must be satisfied before such a transfer shall be made, unless the President and Directors shall direct otherwise.

The lands, tenements and hereditaments which it shall be lawful for the Corporation to hold, shall be only such as shall be requisite for their immediate accommodation in relation to the convenient transaction of their business, and such as shall have been bona fide mortgaged or conveyed to them by way of security, or in satisfaction of debts contracted in the course of their dealings, or purchased at sales upon judgments which shall have been obtained for such debts.

All bills and notes which may be issued by order of the said corporation, signed by the President and countersigned by the Cashier thereof, promising the payment of money to any person or persons, his, her or their order, or to bearer, though not under the seal of the said corporation, shall be binding and obligatory upon the same in the like manner and with the like force and effect, as upon any private person or persons, if issued by him or them, in his, her or their private or natural capacity or capacities, and shall be assignable and negotiable in like manner as if they were issued by such private person or persons, that is to say, those which shall be payable to any person or persons, his, her or their order, shall be assignable by endorsement in like manner and with the like effect, as foreign Bills of Exchange now are, and those which are payable to bearer, shall be negotiable or assignable by delivery only.

That the Treasurer of the Western Shore for the time being, shall be furnished once every year, or oftener if required, with statements of the amount of the capital stock of the said corporation, and of the debts due to and from the same, of the monies deposited therein, of the notes in circulation, of the cash in hand, and of the profits made, and shall have a right to inspect such general accounts in the books of the Bank as shall relate to the said statements, but nothing herein contained shall be construed to imply a right of inspecting the account of any private individual or individuals with the Bank, nor shall such general statement and power of inspection be used for any other purpose than to enable them to form a just opinion of the state of the Institution relative to the public safety, and of the merits thereof, every which shall be hereby appointed guardian, as far as the same relates to the State.

And be it enacted, That the said Bank shall, on or before the first day of January in every year, be audited by a committee of not less than five persons, subscribed for by such Stockholders as the Turnpike Road lead-

ing to Cumberland, as well, together with the several Banks now established in the city of Baltimore and Washington county raise a sum necessary and sufficient to complete the said Road; the said Bank on subscribing in proportion to the amount of capital actually employed and subscribed up, or in operation, and to be paid or advanced in due proportion to the amount of each of the said Banks, subscribed in such periods and at such times as the same may be wanted, and any increase of capital made by the said Bank shall at all succeeding payments thereafter be taken into consideration and be considered as a part of the capital contemplated under this act.

And be it enacted, That the said Bank shall pay to the Treasurer of the Western Shore, the sum of twenty five cents upon the amount of every hundred dollars subscribed and actually paid in for each and every year during the continuance of the said charter, and which sum shall be and the same is hereby pledged by the State as a fund for the purpose of supporting county schools, to be equally divided amongst the several counties of this State, and paid over in equal portions to such persons in each county as the legislature may hereafter appoint.

And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the Western Shore to demand of the said Bank the said sum of twenty-five cents on the sum actually paid in on the first of January in each and every year, during the continuance of this act, after the first of January eighteen hundred and fifteen.

And be it enacted, That upon the said Banks complying with the condition aforesaid, the faith of this State is hereby pledged not to impose any other or further tax bonus or imposition, of any nature or kind on the said Bank, during the continuance of the charter.

And be it enacted, That this act shall continue and be in force until the first day of November eighteen hundred and thirty-five, and until the end of the next session of Assembly that shall happen thereafter, subject however to the provision in the following section.

And be it enacted, That in the event of the several Banks in the City of Baltimore and the Bank in Washington county, not agreeing to the provisions of an Act passed the present session, entitled, "An act to incorporate a Company to make a turnpike road leading to Cumberland, and for the extension of the Charters of the several Banks in this State;" this Act shall be in force until the expiration of the year eighteen hundred and fifteen, and until the end of the next General Assembly thereafter, and no longer.
