Legislature of Maryland.
 HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

Tuesday Dec. 11.

The house met. Present the same members as yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.
 Mr. Tilghman delivers a petition from sundry inhabitants of Washington county, praying that a Bank may be established at the Town of William's Port, by the name of The Conococheague Bank.
 The Speaker laid before the house, a report of the clerk of Frederick county court, relative to the attendance of the Judges.
 Mr. Donaldson delivers a bill for the relief of Joshua Dorsey of the City of Baltimore. Twice read, passed, and sent to the senate.
 On motion by Mr. J. H. Thomas, the following message was sent to the senate.
 Gentlemen of the Senate,
 The hon. Levin Winder, esquire, having been elected Governor of the state of Maryland, we have appointed Messrs. J. H. Thomas & Dorsey, jointly with such gentlemen as shall be named by your house, to wait upon the Governor, and request his attendance in the senate room to qualify according to the constitution and form of government.
 On motion by Mr. Culbreth, the following resolution was read.
 Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore of the State of Maryland pay out of any appropriated money in the treasury, into the treasury of the United States, agreeably to the provisions of the seventh section of the act of congress of the United States of America, entitled, An act to lay and collect a direct tax within the United States, such sum of money as is by the said act directed to be assessed and collected in the state of Maryland.
 Mr. Donaldson delivers a petition from Mark Pringle, of the city of Baltimore, praying the repeal of the act for the extension of Green-st. Referred.
 On motion of Mr. Blake, the following message was sent to the senate.
 Gentlemen of the Senate,
 This being the day designated by the constitution for the election of a Council to the Governor, we propose to go into that appointment at such hour as may be most convenient to your honourable body.
 William B. Martin, Alexander G. Magruder, William H. Ward, Thomas G. Addison, and Samuel Ridout,

are put in nomination by this house, and we have appointed Messrs. Blake and Stevens to join the gentlemen you may appoint to examine the ballots.
 On motion by Mr. J. H. Thomas, Leave given to bring in a bill to extend the powers of the Orphans Courts of the several counties of this state in certain cases.
 The clerk of the senate delivers the following message: Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,
 We have appointed Messrs. Holbrook and Hebb to join the gentlemen nominated by your house to wait upon his Excellency the Governor elect, and request his attendance in the senate chamber for the purpose of qualifying as pointed out by the constitution and form of government.
 Messrs. Tabbs and Fenwick from the senate, acquaint the Speaker, that the Governor elect is attending in the senate room to qualify, and request the attendance of the house of delegates.
 The Speaker, attended by the members of the house, went to the senate room, where his excellency qualified in the mode pointed out by the constitution and form of government; when the Speaker, attended by the members of the house, returned and resumed the chair.
 The clerk of the senate delivers the following message: Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,
 The senate are prepared to go immediately into the appointment of a Council to the Governor.— Messrs. James Nabb, James Butcher, Thomas W. Hall, and Reverdy Griselin are put in nomination by the senate in addition to the persons named in your message. Messrs. Hawkins and Levi Hollingsworth are appointed on the part of the senate, to join the gentlemen named by your house to count the ballots.
 The house having qualified, proceeded to the choice of a council.— The ballots were deposited in the ballot box, and after examining the same, it appeared that William B. Martin, Samuel Ridout, Thomas G. Addison, William H. Ward, and A. C. Magruder, were elected.

 YOUR COMMITTEE beg leave to report, That they have examined the ac-

 he has borrowed from George and John Barber, 7,000 dollars; from the President, Directors and Company of the Farmers Bank of Maryland, 100,000 dollars; from the President and Directors of the Bank of Baltimore, 30,000 dollars; from the President and Directors of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Baltimore, 50,000 dollars; from the President and Directors of the Marine Bank of Baltimore, 10,000 dollars; from the President and Directors of the Union Bank of Maryland, 25,000 dollars; from the President and Directors of the Commercial and Farmers Bank of Baltimore, 20,000 dollars.
 It appears to your committee by the accounts of the said treasurer, he hath paid the sum of 255 dollars, agreeably to the Resolutions of November session, 1797, in discharge of the emissions of bills of credit of June 1780, which emissions your committee have counted and burned.
 That it appears to your committee the said treasurer hath paid away from the first of November, 1812, to the first of Nov. 1813, the sum of 133 dollars 33 cents, of the bills of credit emitted by an act of congress of the 18th March, 1780, and the sum of 237, 244 dollars 81 cts. specie, for all which payments have been produced to your committee the necessary vouchers and receipts; and that there remains in the treasury the sum of 599,717 dollars, 83 cents, exchanged six per cent. stock of the United States; 335,104 dollars 74 cents, funded three per cent. stock of the United States; 4,919 dollars 13 cents, of the emissions of bills of credit made by an act of congress of the 18th of March 1780, and the sum of 204,186 dollars 33 cts. specie; which sum of specie is appropriated in the manner following, to wit:

Thomas, the question was put, That the house adopt the following order: Ordered, That the resolution submitted to the house on the 23rd instant, for paying out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, the sum of \$200,000 of the direct tax laid by the general government, be referred to a committee appointed on that part of the communication of the executive which relates to the loan made in virtue of a resolve of the last general assembly, and the financial resources of the state.

 On motion by Mr. S. Stevens, Leave given to bring in a bill for the building of barges for the defence of Chesapeake bay.
 Mr. Emory delivers a bill for all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the appointment of the Governor and for other purposes. Read.
 On motion by Mr. Emory, Ordered, That the said bill be the order of the day for Wednesday the 12th of January.
 Mr. Emory delivers a bill to libel all such parts of the constitution and form of Government as relate to the appointment of an executive council. Read.
 The clerk of the senate delivers the following message: Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,
 We have received your message of this day, and have appointed Messrs. Wm. Hollingsworth, J. Fenwick, Brown and Holbrook a committee on the part of the state to join the gentlemen named by you to compare and examine the grossed bills. Read.
 On motion by Mr. Stonestreet, Leave given to bring in a bill authorizing persons to whom letters mentary or of administration have been or may be granted in the Territory of Columbia to prosecute recover claims in this state.
 The house proceeded to the election of a director in the Bank of Baltimore: The ballots being opened in the ballot box, the gentleman to strike retired, and a name returned and reported, Samuel Fernandis was elected.
 Whereupon, Resolved, That Samuel Fernandis be, and he is so declared to be, a director in the Bank of Baltimore on behalf of the state for the ensuing year.
 Mr. J. H. Thomas delivers a bill to extend the powers of the courts of this state in certain cases. Referred.

 The report of the committee appointed by the legislature of New-Hampshire to enquire into the expediency of paying out of the treasury of that state her quota of the direct tax of our country—After a most careful consideration of the subject, they came to the conclusion, that to assess the payment would be impolitic, in as much as the amount would be expended in collection more than the 13 per cent discount on the United States. Moreover, that to impose only in favor of one description of taxes, the excessive land-taxes, who possess the ability to pay such impositions, would be subject to the personal property of the state—in this respect, the principle of such a measure would be with the ability of assessment, to a sum of days to their immediate relief. Any state which possesses funds, they think it much greater advantage to apply them to increase the power of the armistice, and mitigation of a calamity, than to contribute to the support of a government which will tend to the ruin of the state to which they will lend their assistance. The most rational consequences of such a policy would be to increase the number of the state.
