NEW-YORK, FEB. 19. THE GOY TOMKINS, SHALERS, Extract of a letter from Nathaniel Shaler, Commander of the private armed schooner Goy Tomkins, to his agent in New York, dated At Sea, Jan. 1.

Two days after dispatching Netzel, I took a whaleman's London bound for the South, but the being of no value, out such stores &c. as I could, and being much lumbered with soners and baggage, I put the board and ordered her for Falkland. The chasing of this ship had me some distance from my ground and owing to calms, I could not gain it till the 25th ultimo, when sunrise, 3 sail were discovered. We made sail in chase of wind being light, we came up with them. On a near approach, they proved to be two and a brig. One of the ships all the appearance of a large port, and from their maneuvers have concerted measures for defence. The large ship appeared to be prepared to take the battle. Boats were seen passing and from her, she had her nettings almost up to her topmast studdingsail boom and sails at their ends ready running, as if prepared for a fight. Her ports appeared painted, and she had something deck resembling a merchant boat. After all this, what would you think she was? I have a little patience and I will have. At 3 P. M. a sudden struck us from the northward, the ship not having yet returned before I could get our light struck and almost before I could turn I was under the guns (not transport) but of A LARGE GATE!!! and not more than third of a mile from her.

I immediately hauled down lish colours, which I previously up, set three American ensigns, trimmed our sails by the wind, commenced a brisk fire from little battery; but this was not with woeful interest. Her broadside killed two men and ded 6 others (two of whom were, and one since dead)—blew up one of my salt boxes, two 9 pound cartridges; they communicated fire to a number of tools, and three tube boxes, were lying on the companion all of which exploded, and the tubes penetrated through crevice under the companion and found their way to the floor; but that being wet, a firescreen being up, no further accident took place. This, with the fire from the frigate, sure you, made warm work Tomkins' quarter deck, but to her heels and the exertions brave officers and crew, I still the command of her.

When the frigate opened on me, it was about half past 11. I was then a little abaft her. To have attempted to tack hard squall, would, at least, have exposed me to a raking fire, have attempted it, and miss. I have been attended with the table loss of the schooner. I thought it most prudent to tack on the tack on which I was. This I was exposed to from a situation I have mentioned, passed her bow; she all the standing on with me, and almost as ourselves—and such as was played round my ears, sure you, I never wish to hear on the same key.

At 4 his shot began to fall on us. At 4 30, the wind dived, and the enemy still holding their ship began to reach us, out sweeps and turned all her guns threw over all the shot from the deck, and about 2 o'clock from the after hold, about 3 P. M. all his shot fell

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
