Copy of a letter from Brig. General Stricker to Maj. Gen. Smith, dated Head Quarters, 3d Brigade, Baltimore, Sept. 15, 1814.

Major Gen. S. Smith, Sir-I have the honour to report to far you, that in obedience to your orders, I ma marched from Baltimore on Sunday the ing 11th inst. with part of my brigade, as the advanced corps of the army under Car your command. My force consisted of pan 550 of the 5th regt. under lt. col Sterrett, 620 of the 6th under lt. col. M'Do- cap nald; 500 of the 27th under lt. col. Long; me 450 of the 39th under lt. col. Fowler; ten 700 of the 51st under lt. col. Amey; 150 ridemen under capt. Dyer; 140 cavalry to under It. col. Biays; and the Union Ar- adv tillery of 75 men, with 6 4 pounders, to under capt. Montgomery, making an aggregate of 3185 effective men. I moved towards North Point by the main road, cor and at 8 o'clock p. m. reached the meet- mil ing house near the head of Bear Creek, my miles from the city. Here the brigade ate halted, with the exception of the caval- me ry was were pushed forward to Gor- and ch's farm, 3 miles in advance, & the wor ritlemen who took post near the black- ing smith's shop, two miles in advance of bei our encampment. At 7 o'clock on the skip morning of the 12th, I received infor- und mation from the advanced videttes that ene the enemy were debarking troops from cro and under cover of their gun vessels less which lay off the bluff of North Point pre within the mouth of the Patapseo river. ry, immediately ordered back my baggage under a strong guard, moved forward in the 5th and 27th regts, and my artillery, the head of Long-Log-Lane, (so call. d) resting the 5th with its right on the head of a branch of Bear creek, and its left on the main North Point road. while the 27th was posted on the other ide of the road in line with the 5th, its eft extended towards a branch of Back iver. The artillery I posted directly the head of the lane in the interval etween the 5th and 27th. The 39th occupied a ground 300 yards in the rear of the 27th, and the 51st the same distrace in the rear of the 5th, extending each parallel to the front line.
