GLORIOUS TRIUMPH.

It is with the liveliest emotions we announce to our distant readers the complete regeneration of this County. After having slumbered for fourteen years in the arms of Democracy, the citizens of Anne-Arundel county have awakened; they have become sensible of their wanderings; they have returned to the right path; they have embraced the true faith; they have broken down their idols; they have renounced their idolatry. It is the strongest evidence that the good people of the county have only to be convinced to ensure the prevalence of correct opinion. The change has been radical, we confidently trust it will be permanent.

The Election has resulted in the choice of John C. Herbert, esq. for Congress, and Brice J. Worthington, Col. Thos. Hood, Dr. Richard Hopkins, and Thomas B. Dorsey, for the Assembly—the four first named are true disciples of the Washington school.

In our paper of last week we published an account of the proceedings of a committee, of which Mr. Augustine Gambrell was said to have been the chairman, and Mr. Thomas Furlong the secretary. We had every reason to believe that we were sanctioned in the proceeding by the consent and approbation of the chairman and secretary. We had no hope that Augustine Gambrell's name could have given much weight to the recommendation of the committee, and therefore the political objects to be attained by an imposture of the kind, could certainly not be so very important as to silence the moral reprobation which every man who has a respect for his character must feel, to the deliberate propagation of a falsehood. It was at the request, and on the authority, of gentlemen of character, that the publication was made; and it was with much surprise that we read in the next number of the Maryland Republican a direct contradiction, by Mr. Gambrell, of the whole proceeding. Our readers will find by the subjoined certificates, that prevarication and falsehood have been practised somewhere. Of Mr. Gambrell's political and moral principles we have at this time nothing to say; our object is to exculpate this Journal from any participation in an imposture of the public, whether that imposture has been practised by Gambrell or others.

"October 1st, 1814.
