NEW-YORK, OCT. 16. Noon.
We learn by a passenger in the steam-boat Car of Neptune, that Com. Chauncey's fleet was lying in Sackett's Harbour, with springs on their cables, expecting to be attacked by the enemy's fleet, which was in readiness to sail from Kingston. The militia were marching from all quarters into the Harbour. Nothing new from our armies.

CONGRESS.
HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Saturday, Oct. 15.

REMOVAL FROM WASHINGTON.
Mr. Lewis, of Va. called up for consideration the bill for the temporary removal of the seat of government from the City of Washington.

The question for the rejection of the bill came first in order, and was stated by the following vote:
For the rejection 76
Against it 79

The bill was then read a second time and referred to a committee of the whole; and the house immediately resolved itself into a committee of the whole on the said bill.

Mr. Fisk of N. Y. moved to fill the blank for the place of removal with Philadelphia.

Mr. Lewis of Va. moved to fill it with Georgetown.

Mr. Lewis, and Mr. Hopkins of Kentucky, spoke against the insertion of Philadelphia, and Mr. Pickering in favor of it.

The motion to insert Philadelphia was agreed to by a large majority; and the other blanks in the bill were filled up.

Mr. Lewis of Va. then moved to insert the following section as an amendment to the bill:
"And be it further enacted, That the annual sum of one hundred thousand dollars be and is hereby appropriated for the term of five years, to be applied under the direction of the President of the U. States, for the erection of suitable buildings within the City of Washington for the accommodation of the President of the U. States, the two Houses of Congress, and the several departments of the government, and that the same shall be paid annually to the order or orders of the President of the U. S."

After much interesting debate, this motion was agreed to, ayes 95.

The committee rose and reported the bill with the amendments, which were also concurred in by the House.

And the question was then put: "Shall the said bill be engrossed and read the third time?" and decided as follows—Yeas 74. Nays 83.

So the House determined that the bill should not be engrossed for a third reading; in other words, that it should be rejected.

Adjourned.

A morning statement of the troops in service within the district, whether regulars volunteers or militia, will be forwarded without delay to the office of the Assistant Adjutant General, Baltimore, at which place Head-Quarters will be established until further orders.

The Major General will have the pleasure of reviewing the troops in succession, in the course of the present week, of which intention commanders of brigades and corps will be more particularly notified. In the meantime, it is confidently expected that no exertions will be spared to give to the troops the highest degree of efficiency, which the expectations of the country, and the fame of individual corps so imperiously demand.

NEW-YORK, Oct. 12.
BY THE STEAM-BOAT.
The Buffalo mail which was due at Albany on Sunday, had not arrived on Monday evening. The Albany Argus of Tuesday morning gives the following as an extract of a letter from an officer at Williams-ville, under date of the 6th inst.—
"Gen. Izard has arrived with 4500 men, and the army are on a move to follow the enemy, who have retreated, and it is said, are fortifying at Chippewa and Queenston. Major Birdsall is recovering from his wounds."
Three hundred British prisoners, taken in the sortie from Fort Erie, arrived on Sunday last.

The gallant Com. McDonough is expected in Albany in the course of the present week; and the Corporation of that city are making preparations to receive him in a manner due to the important and invaluable services he has lately rendered to his country.

From the Correspondent of the Columbian.
Plattsburgh Bay, Oct. 3.
"I this morning conversed with a gentleman of high standing from Champlain, (whose veracity can be depended on) who informs that the enemy have broke up their encampment at Champlain, and retreated beyond Odletown; and that he conversed with a number of British officers, high in rank, who unambiguously express their disgust at Sir George's hasty and cowardly retreat.

It is the opinion of this gentleman, unless Sir George is recalled, the officers (particularly those from Spain) will not serve in Canada.

Two hundred and sixty American seamen and a proportionate number of officers have been sent from this Lake to Lake Ontario.

The ship Saratoga and the schr. Ticonderoga, also the prize ship Constance and the brig Linnet, have been sent to lay up at Whitehall."

Two hundred United States Light Dragoons passed through the village of Geneva the 29th ult. for the Niagara frontier; and yesterday about 400 U. States troops passed there for the same destination.

Two regiments of militia from Genessee county, composing the brigade of the late Brig. General Davis, have been discharged by Gen. Brown.
