His kind providence originally conducted them, to one of the best portions of the dwelling place, allowed for the great family of the human race. He protected and cherished them, under all the diffi-culties, and trials to which they lie bells, ever and anon, "thunderwere exposed in their early days.

pursuits, prepared them for a tranition in due time for a state of independence and of self government. In the arduous struggle by which it was attained, they were distinguished by multiplied tokens of his benign interposition. During the interval which succeeded, he reared them in strength, and endowed them with the resources, which have enabled them to assert their national rights, and to enhance their national character, in another arduous conflict, which is now happily terminated, by a peace and reconciliation with those who have been our enemies. And to the same Divine Author of every good and perfect gift, we are indebted for all those privileges and advantages, religious as well as civil, which are so richly

Extract of a letter to a gentleman in Baitimore, dated

Matheus Court House, Va. Feb. 18. .. Is is with great satisfaction I have it in my power to inform you, that I have this evening anchored a fine schooner in Plankitank, which was captured from the enemy yesterday by a small detachment under my command. The circumstances of her capture and recapture are these: - The schooner Saturn, capt. Matheas Rich of Baltimore, was captured by H. B. M. Menelaus on the 14th instant, near the capes and ordered for Tang ers under command of a midshipman and purser, with six sailors and eight negroes, but grounded on the Wolf Trap, which gave us an opportunity to bring one of our field pieces to amuse them. which soon made them surrender, when I boarded her with eight hands and succeeded in getting her off .--There are 120 barrels of herrings on board. Two of the negroes belong in the neighbourhood of Annapolis, but wall not tell their owners names; but I am informed by one of the officers that one belongs to Mrs. Ogie. Capt. Rich jis on board the Menelaus, also capt. White of Baltimore."
