FOREIGNINTELLIGENCE. Received by the Milo, arrived at Bosten from Liverpool?

London, April 24. We have received a Hamburg mail with papers to the 19th ult. Their contents are important because they confirm us in the opinion that we have already formed as to the unalterable determination of the allied sovereigns to proceed in their hostilities against Buonaparto with the utmost promptitude, and with fall the power of their states The king of Prussia issued a proclamation at Vienna on the 7th inst. The language is precisely in the same spirit with the declaration of the 13th of March, and the treaty of the 25th. The most ardent spirit of loyalty is said to prevail among the youth of the Prussian monarchy.

The new treaty of all ance signed at Vienna on the 25th of March, ic is said was ratified on Saturday afternoon.

It has been suggested, that Louis the 18th would join the allied sovereigns atclirankfort; but recent letters say that he will remain some time longer at Ghent.

It was erroneously stated some time ago, that M. de Chateaubrand had remained at Paris, and embraced the cause of the usurper. That eloquent and admirable writer is with his sovereign at Ghent, as is M. Lally Tolendel.

It is said that Buonaparte would not permit lord F. Somerset to take with him from Paris the Duke of Wellington's valuable plate, which had been presented to him in commemoration of his many glorious victories.

Admiral Gantheume has assumed

the command of the Toulon fleet. The conscription laws are, it is said, again acted upon in France. A demand of 1500 men has been made upon Dieppe.

A strong channel fleet will be immediately collected, as a fleet of observation, under the command of lord Keith. Naval arrangements are also making in and relative to the islands near the French coast, and an admiral is about to be;re-appointed; but on whom the command is to be conferred is not yet mention.

Vienna, April 8. Official news is this moment received that the king of Naples had declared for the allies, and that a Neapolitan army of 45,000 men will immediately join them against Buo-

naparte.
The high allies have demanded from the French the delivering up of Buonaparte, and also a strong guarantee for the future maintenance of peace and order. In case of refusal, they will march their whole force into France—Spain and Portugal have engaged to send 80,000 men into the field.

Last night M. Lomlard, secretary to the Austrian legation at Paris, arrived here. He has brought proposals from Buonaparte, who when he finds diplomatic agents, makes seemingly amicable proposals, which however, will be no where attend-

The publication of the abdication of Maria Louisa, is expected from day to day, but has not yet taken

It was on the 25th of March that the new definitive treaty of allianco between Austria, Russia, Prussia and Great Britain, was signed in order to put an end as soon as possible, to the power of the usurper in France. The treaty of Chaumont is taken as the basis. The number of troops which each of the four united powers engage to bring into the field, is fixed at 150,000 men.-The Portuguese minister has acapprobation of his king. The Swedish minister has sent to his court for instructions. Denmark has likewise acceded to this alliance, on condition of the execution of the reaty of Kiel ...

TREATY OF ALLIANCE, OF-FENSIVE AND DEFENSIVE.

BETWEEN RUSSIA, AUSTRIA, PRUS-SIA AND GREAT BRITAIN. In the name of the Holy and Undivi-ded Trinity.

Their Majesties the Emperor of all the Russias, the Emperor of Austria, the King of Prussia, and the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, considering the consequences which the entrance of Buonaparte into France, and the present situation of that kingdom, may have with respect to the security of Europe, have determined, in these weighty circumstances, to carry into effect the principles consecrated in the treaty of Ghaumont. They have therefore agreed, by a solemn treaty, mutually signed by each of the four powers, to renew the engagement that they will defend the so happily re-stored order of things in Europe against all violation, and to adopt the most effectual measures for carrying this engagement into effect, and also to give it that necessary extension which existing circumstances imperiously demanded.

[Here follow the appointments, in the usual form, of the different Plenipotentiaries whose names are un-

dersigned.]
Art. 1. The High contracting Powers solemnly engage to unite the resources of their respective states, for the maintainance of the Treaty of Peace concluded at Paris on the 30th of May, 1814, as well as that of the Congress at Vienna-to carry into effect the dispositions contained in these treaties-inviolably to observe their ratified and subscribed agreements according to their full import-to defend them against every attack, and especially against the project of Napoieon Buonaparte. Towards this end they bind themselves, should the King of France desire it, and in the spirit of the Declaration issued on the 13th of March, with common consent and mutual agreement, to bring to justice all such as may have already joined, or shall hereafter join the party of Napoleon, in order to compel him to relinquish his projects, and render him incapable in future of disturbing the tranquility of Europe and the general peace, under the protection of which the rights, the freedom, and independence of nations have been established and

secured. II. Although so great and salutary an object does not permit that the means destined to its attainment should be limited, and although the High Contracting Powers have resolved to devote to this object all such resources as they can, in their respective situations, dispose of; yet they have nevertheless agreed that every one of them shall constantly have in the field 150,000 men complete, of whom at least one tenth shall be cavalry, with a proportion-ate artillery (not reckoning gar-risons) and to employ them in ac-tive and united service against the common enemy.

III. The High Contracting Parties solemnly engage not to lay down their arms but in agreement with each other, nor until the object of the war assigned in the 1st Article of the present treaty shall have been attained; nor until Buonaparte shall be wholly, and completely de-prived of the power of exciting disturbances, and of being able to renew his attempts to obtain the chief power in France.
