So we have often been told
that we have no proof of it, yet in
democratic Virginia no body is allowed
to vote but freeholders. Now, as Vir-
ginia is democratic, and democrats are
allowing poor people to vote, surely
a proposition to alter the laws of the
state would be most gladly ac-
cepted. The "proof of the pudding
is in the eating." A proposition was
made during the last session of the gen-
eral assembly of Virginia, to call a
convention for the purpose of altering
the constitution. Yes—and the demo-
cratic legislature rejected it. This is
proof of many things which might be
adduced that democrats, when they have
in their power, will not allow a poor
man, or any man but a landholder, to
vote. To be sure, when they cannot
help it, then they boast amazingly of
their love of universal suffrage.

On Sunday, the thirty-first of March, 1816,
at the residence of Francis Asbury, Bishop
of the Methodist Episcopal Church, of this
city, a great assembly of the friends of
universal suffrage, having labored in his
loft, more than fifty years, as an itinerant
Minister. In the death of such a laborer,
the Church of Christ in general, & particularly
the portion of it over which he was more im-
mediately called to preside, has sustained a loss,
which must be deeply felt and long re-
minded. His unobtrusive zeal for the salvation of souls,
his unobtrusive, though it grew pain from his
weakness, to travel and preach the ever-
lasting gospel until the lamp of life trembled
in the feeble socket, and when unable to speak
the comforting assurances of his holy tri-
une, he was, in the full possession of his
reason, and his willingness and readi-
ness to meet his God and enjoy him forever.
Of the afflictions of his suffering flock, and
the prayers of thousands could have preserved
him, he still had lived to go in and out before
them, as he has done, for nearly half a century,
to the joy and delight of his hearers—
They have ever equalled, none have surpassed
him in his zealous and labors to spread the reli-
gious of Christ, and save souls. A more pure
and disinterested character, it is expected, will be given
to the life, labors, and usefulness of this spi-
ritual and beloved Father in Israel, who ceas-
ed to work and live.
Laid in the garner of the sky,
He lives with God, no more to die.
