That the certificate of report and registry, required as evidence of the time of arrival in the United States according to the 2d section of the act of the 14th of April, 1812, entitled, "An act to establish an uniform rule of naturalization, and to repeal the act heretofore passed on this subject ;' and also, a tertificate from the proper clerk or prothonotary, of the declaration of intention, made before a court aforesaid, and required as the first condition, according to the first section of said act; shall be exhibited by every alien, on his application to be admitted a citizen of the United States in pursuance of said act, who shall have arrived within the limits, and under the jurisdiction of the United States, since the 18th June, 1812, and shall each be recited at full length, in the record of the court admitting such alien; otherwise he shall not be deemed to have complied with the conditions requisite for becoming a citizen of the United States. And any pretended admission of an alien, who shall have arrived within the limits and under the jurisdiction of the United States, since the said 18th day of June, 1812, to be a citizen, after the promulgation of this act, without such recital of each certificate, at full length, shall be of no validity, or effect, under the

Sect. 2. Provided and be it further enacted, That nothing herein contained shall be construed to exclude, from admission to citizenship, any free white person who was residing within the limits and under the jurisdiction of the United States. at any time between the 18th day of June, 1798, and the 14th day of April 1802; and who having conti nued to reside therein, without having made any declaration of intention before a court of record, as aforesaid, may be entitled to become a citizen of the U. S. according to the act of the 26th of March, 1814, entitled, An act in addition to an act, entitled, 'An act to establish an uniform rule of naturalization, and to repeal the act heretofore passed on that subject.' Whenever any person, without a certificate or such declaration of intention, shall make application to be admitted a citizen of the U. States as aforesaid; it shall be proved to the satisfaction of the court, that the applicant was residing within the limits under the, iurisdiction of the United States: before the 14th day of April, 1802, and has continued to reside within the same, or he shall not be so admitted. And the residence of the applicant within the limits and under the jurisdiction of the United States, for at least five years, imme-diately preceding the time of such application, shall be proved by the Leather and Shop Makers Utensils.
