I have thought proper by the advice of a number of the members of the Faculty to fix upon he first Monday in December next, for a spe ciai Convention to be held in the City of Bal-

At a stated meeting of the Faculty in 1807 At a stated meeting of the Faculty in 1807 it was conceived that medical and objurgical knowledge would be greatly promoted by establishing district societies throughout the state, when the subjoined resolutions were passed. Practitioners of medicine and surgery must see the importance of those resolutions as well as the organ advantage that will rough from carrying importance of these resolutions as well as the great advantage that will result from carrying them into proper effect. It is urged and most ardently expected, that where these societies are not already organized, the subject will be taken into effective consideration; and that every society will be prepared to meet this special correnties with that zeal which the lastitution requires.

1st. Resolved, That the State of Maryland be divided into seven medical districts, as follows, viz: St Mary's, Charles and Calvert counties, to constitute the 1st. district. I rinca-George's and Montgomery, the 2d Anne-Arundel and Baltimore, the 3d Frederick, Washington and Allegany, the 4th Harford, Czcil and Kent, the 5th. Queen-Ann's, Talbor and Caroline, the 6th. Doschester, Somerser and Worcester, the 7th.
