LORD EXMOUTH'SOFFICIAL LETTER.

The London Gazette Extraordinary Sunday Sapt. 15.

Admiralty Office, Sept, 15. Capt. Brisbane of his Majesty's ship Queen Charlotte, arrived at this office last night with the following despatches from Admiral Lord Exmouth, G. C. B. addressed to John Wilson Crocker, Esq:-

Queen Charlotte, Algiers Bay, Aug 23 SIR-In all the vicissitudes of a long life of public service, no circumstance has ever produced on my mind such impressions of gratitude and joy as the event of yesterday. To have been one of the humble instruments, in the hands of Divine Providence, for bringing to reason a ferocious Government, and destroying forever the insufferable and horrid system of Christian slavery, can never cease to be a source of delight and heartfelt comfort to every individual happy enough to be employed in it. I may, I hope, be permitted, under such impressions, to offer my sincere congratulations to their Lordships on the complete success which attended the gallant efforts of his Majesty's fleet, in their attack upon Algiers of yesterday;

Thus has a provoked war of two day's existence been attended by a complete victory, and closed by a renewed peace for England and her Ally, the King of the Netherlands, on conditions dictated by the firmness and wisdom of his Majesty's government, commanded by the vigour of their measures.

My thanks are justly due for the honor and confidence his Majesty's Ministers have been pleased to repose on my zeal, on this highly important occasion. The means were by them made adequate to my own wishes, and the rapidity of their measures speak for themselves. Not more than one hundred days since. I left Algiers with the British fleet, unsuspicious and ignorant of the atrocities which had been committed at Bona; that fleet, on its arrival in England, was necessarily disbanded, and another, with proportionate resources, created and equipped; and although impeded in its progress by calms and adverse winds, has poured the vengeance of an insulted nation, in chastising the cruelties of a ferocious government, with a promptitude beyond example, and highly honorable to the national character -eager to resent oppression or cruelty, whenever practised upon those under their protection.

Would to God, that, in the attainment of this object, I had not deeply to lament the severe loss of so many gallant officers and men; they have profusely bold in a contest which has been peculiarly marked by proofs of such devoted heroism as would rouse every noble feeling, did I dare indulge in relating them.

Their Lordships will already have been informed, by his Majesty's sloop Jasper, of my proceedings up to the 14th inst. on which day L broke ground from Gibraltar, after a vexatious detention, by a foul wind, of tour days.

The fleet, complete in all its points, with the addition of five gun boats, fitted at Gibraltar, departed in the highest spirits, and with the most favourable prospects of reaching the port of their destination in three days, but an adverse wind destroyed the expectation of an early arrival, which was the more anxiously looked for by myself, in consequence of hearing, the day I sailed from Gibraltar, that a large army had been assembled and that very considerable additional works were throwing up, not only on both flanks of the city, but also immediately about the entrance of the Mole; from this I was apprehensive that my intention of making that point the principal object of attack had been discovered to the Dey by the same means he had heard of the expedition. This in-telligence was, on the following night, greatly confirmed by the Prometheus, which I had despatchnight, greatly confirmed by the Prometheus, which I had despatched to Algiers some time before, to endeavour to get sway the Consultant of the Consultant of

succeeded in bringing away, disguised in midshipman's uniforing, his wife and daughter, leaving a boat to bring off their infant child, coming down in a basket with the surgeon, who thought he had comthe gate way, and in consequence the surgeon, 3 midshipmen, in all 18 persons, were seized and confined as slaves in the usual dungeons. The child was sent off next morning by the Dey, and as a solitary instance of his humanity, it ought to be recorded by me.

Captain Dashwood, further confirmed, that about 40,000 men had been brought down from the interior, and all the Janissaries called in from distant garrisons, and that they were indefatigably employed in their batteries, gunboats, &c. aud every where strengthening the sea defences.

The Dey informed capt. Dashwood he knew perfectly well the armament was destined for Algiers, and asked him, if it was true; he replied, if he had such information he knew as much as he did, and probably from the same source-

the public prints. . The ships were all in port, and between 40 and 50 gun and mortarboats ready, with several more in forward repair. The Dey had closely confined the Consul, and refused either to give him up or promise his personal safety; nor would he hear a word respecting the officers and men seized in the boats of the Prometheus.

From the continuance of adverse winds and calms, the land to the westward of Algiers was not made before the 16th, and the next morning at day break, the fleet was advanced in sight of the city, though not so near as I had intended. As the ships were becalmed, I embraced this opportunity of despatching a boat under cover of the Severn, with a flag of truce, and the demands I had to make, in the name of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, on the Dey of Algiers. (of which the accompanying are copies;) directing the officer to wait two or three hours for the Dey's answer, at which time, if no reply was sent, he was to return to the flag ship; he was met near the Mole by the Captain of the Port, who, on being told the answer was expected in one hour, replied that it was impossible. The officer then said he would wait two or three hours; he then observed, two hours were quite sufficient.

The fleet at this time, by the springing up of the sea breeze, had reached the bay, and were preparing the boats and flotilla for service until near two o'clock, when observing my officer was returning with the signal flying that no answer had been received, after a delay of upwards of three hours, I instantly made the signal to know if the ships were all ready, which being answered in the affirmative, the Queen Charlotte bore up, followed by the fleet, for their pointed stations; the flag, leading in the prescribed order, was an-chored in the entrance of the Mole, at about fifty yards distance. At this moment not a gun had been, fired, and I began to suspect a full compliance with the terms, which had been so many hours in their hands; at this period of profound silence, a shot was fired at us from the Mole, and two at the ships to the northward then following; this was promptly returned by the Queen Charlotte, who was then lashing to the mainmast of a brig. fast to the shore in the mouth of the Mole, and which we had steered for, as the guide to our position.
