FROM A SERMON ON THE AUTUMN. Text—" And Isace went out to

meditate in the Field, at the even tide.':- Gen. 24, 63.

THERE is an "even tide" in the day-an hour when the sun retires, and the shadows fall, and when nature assumes the appearance of soberness and silence. It is an hour from which every where the thoughtless fly, as peopled only in their imagination with images of gloom; it is the hour on the other hand, which in every age, the wise have loved, as bringing with it sentiments and affections more valuable than all the splendors of the day.

Its first impression is to still the turbulence of thought or passion which the day may have brought forth. We follow with our eye the descending sun; we listen to the decaying sounds of labour and of toil-and, when all the fields are lent around us, we feel a kindred stillness to breathe upon our souis, and to calm them from the agitations of society. From this first impression, there is a second, which naturally follows it-In the day we are living with men-in the "even tide" we begin to live with nature; we see the world withdrawn from us-the shades of night darken over the habitations of men, and we feel ourselves alone. It is an hour fitted as it would seem, by Him who made us, to still, but with gent hand, the throb of every unruly assion and the ardour of every impure desire; and, while it veils for a time the world that misleads us, to awaken in our hearts those legitimate affections which the heat of the day may have dissolved, there is yet la farther scene it presents to-us While the world withdraws from us, and while the shades of the evening darken upon our dweilings, the splendors of the firmament come forward to our view. In the moments when earth is overshadowed. heaven opens to our eyes the radiance of a sublimer Being; our hearts follow the successive splendors of the scene; and while we torget, for a time the obscurity of earthly concerns, we feel that there are " yet greater things than these." There is, in the second place, an

weven tide" in the year—a season when the sun withdraws his propil tious light; when the winds arise, and the leaves fall and niture around us seems to singinto decay. It is said, in general, to be the season of melancholy; and if, by this le meant that it is the time of solemn and of serious thought, it is undoubtedly the season of metancholy, yet, it is a melancholy so soothing, so gentle, in its approach, and so prophetic in its influence, that they who have known it, feel, as instinctively, that it is the doing of God, and that the heart of man is not thus finely touched, but to fine issues.

When we go into the fields in the evening of the year, a different voice approaches us .- We regard even in spite of ourselves, the still but steady advances of time. A few days ago, and the summer of the year was grateful, and every element was filled with life, and the sun of Heaven seemed to glory in his ascenda to-He is now enfeebled in his powers the desert no more "blossome like the rose 25 the song of joy is no more heard among the branch es, and the earth is strewed with that foliage which once bespoke the magnificence of summer. Whateciety has awakened, we pause amid this apparent desolation of nature.

We die down in the longe "of the

way faring man in the wilderness, we feel that all we witness it the emblem of our own fate. Such also, in a few years, will be our own condition. The blossoms of our Spring-the pride of our Summer, will also fade into decay; and the

pulse that now beats high with virtuous or with vicious desire, wil graduall, sink, and then must stop rever. We rise from our medita ons with hearts softened and subdued, and we return into life as in to a shadowy scen-, where we have disquieted ourselves in vain."

Yet a few years, we think, and all that now bless, or all that now convulse humanity, will a p; baye perished. The mightiest pageantry of life will pass-the loudest notes of triumph or of conquest will be silent in the grave—the wicked, wherever active, will cease from troubling, and the weary, wherever suffering, will be at rest. Under an impression so profound, we feet our own hearts better .- The cares the animosities, the hatreds, which society may have engendered, sink unperceived from our bosoms. In the general desolution of nature, we feel the littleness of our passions -we look forward to that kindred evening which time must it ng to all;—we applicable the caves of those who hate and of those who love. Every unkind passion falls with the leaves that fall around us; and we return slowly to our homes. and to the society which surrounds us, with the wish only to enlighten

or to bless them. There is an even tide in human life, a season when the eye becomes dim, and the strength decays, and when the winter of age begins to shed, upon the human head, its prophetic snow. It is the season of life to which the present is most analo gous; and much it becomes, & much it would profit you, my eldest brethren, to mark the instructions which the season brings.

The spring and the summer of your days are gone, and with them not only the joys they knew, out many of the friends who gave them. -You have entered upon the autumn of your being; and whatever may have been the profusion of your spring, or the warm- intemperance of your summer, there is yet a sesson of stillness and solitude which the beneficence of Heaven affords you, in which you may meditate upon the past and the future, and prepare yourself for the mighty change which you are soon to undergo.

In the long retrospect of your ourney, you have seen every day he shades of the evening fall, and every year the clouds of winter gather. But you have seen also, every succeeding day, the morning arise n its brightness, and in every succeeding year, spring return to renovate the winter of nature. It is now you may understand the magnificent language of Heaven-it mingles its voice with that of revelation-it summons you in these hours, when the leaves fall and the winter is gathering, to that evening study which the mercy of Heaven has provided in the book of salvation. And, while the shado y valley opens, which leads to the abode of death, it speaks of that hand which can comfort and can save, and which can conduct to those "green pastures, and those still waters," where there is an eternal spring for the children of God.
