The allowance of provisions grows less, and the quality is worse every week. Some of the officers of the Newcastle obtained permission to visit Longwood, and finding the emperor by chance in the garden, were received by him with the utmost kindness. Countess Bertrand wrote some time ago to Sir George Cockburn on some subject relative to their treatment, but sir George has not hitherto condescended make any reply. The island has been visited by a contagious fever, from the effects of which several of the principal inhabitants have -namely, the town major, Barran; Mrs. Porteues, Dr. Crawd, Messrs.
