Various letters from Baujoeway, gie mention, that towards the middle of January, the mountain Idiensi situated at about 24 leagues from Baujoewaugie, began to break out and spread fear and desolation over. the surrounding country. On the night of the 23d and 24th January there was a great eruption; in-mense columns of fire and smoke and ordammable substances, ascended from the mountain with a noise si. milar to that of thunder or artille. ry; the earth quaked even at Bau. oswangie. A prodigious quantity of cinders, earth and sand vomited forth by the mountain, soon covered all the neighbouring fields, and utterly destroyed the crops of rice, which before had the most befuild appearance. The air became so surcharged with clouds of ashes & sulphurous smoke, that it was scattely possible to respire, and for sive, ral days after the light of day wir scarcely visible at Baujoewauje, The greater part of the birds have perished, and along the rivers no-thing is to be seen but dead fish floating on the surface of the water, Enormous blocks of stone, and trees
