From'a London paper. POWER OF RUSSIA

It is a fact which cught evertobe kept in mind, that all the discussions which have taken place on the growing and dangerous power, of Russia took their, rise from a paragraph published in the Courier, under the title of fe Extract of a letter from Frankfort. That article was written in London. The Editor of the Courier cannot venture to say that he did not receive it as a part of his daily instructions from Office; and with the knowledge of this fact, the public may judge of the decency with which he talks of fabricated documents. The alarm, therefore, respecting the power and projects of Russia came from headquarters, and it is not to be wondered at, when we look at the proofs which are daily accumulating of its gigantic strides. A plan of the proccted expedition of India, as digested by Buonaparte, was found in the port-folio of the Minister of War in Parts. This paper was, no doubt, known to the Author of the Sketch of the power of Russia, though he does not give it; but it serves to prove the accuracy of his statement as to the facility of such a march.
