A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, it appeareth unto me by an Inquisition taken before John Aisquith, Esquire, one of the Coroners of Balti-more county, that a most atrocious mur der was committed on the person of a certain William Henry M'Cubbin, a citizen of thec'y of Bultimore, by some unknown person, on or about the twenty second day of October last, which In quisition hath been returned to me accompanied by a memorial of sundry respectable persons, inhabitants of the city of Baltimore, praying the interposi-tion of Government: And whereas the quiet and security of the State depend on the vigilance of the constituted authorities in causing the laws against such enormities to be duly executed.
