At no period have the mercies of our Divine Beneficence been more signally displayed: Peace and tranquillity, all that a Country can desire for its prosperity, and the most abundant and inviolably maintained institutions, & elevate to the glory of our Nation the triumph of the glory of our Nation's Christianity, literally rewarding the industry, from the horn of her dance; Science and the Arts, the genius, to whatever can improve, and ameliorate the condition of the human race, and extending her mild influence throughout the world; her hand, and shedding her benediction upon the public morals & manners; these are chief among the blessings which demand a People's gratitude to the Divine and munificent Author of them.
In these mercies the good People of the State of Maryland have abundantly participated; the wounds inflicted on her prosperity by the rage of war, are already healed; Agriculture repays with rich abundance the industry of her sons; her Commerce whitens every sea, and renders the remotest quarters of the globe tributary to her wealth & power; while her Manufactures carry her forward to the proudest anticipations of real life, and in the full and unrestrained enjoyment of these and other blessings it is meet that we remember with grateful hearts, the divine source from whence they all proceed, and praise unto the Lord, thanksgiving and praise for all his mercies towards us, acknowledge our dependence on his bounty, implore pardon for our unworthiness, and pay our vows of renewed love and obedience.
