LAW CASIS. Yesterday came on the cause of the People vs. Henry B. Hagerman, before his honour the Mayor and Aldermen Thorpe and Munson. It occupied the court from noon till half past one in the morning, when the charge of the court was delivered to the jury. The indictment contained two distinct charges; the first for an assault and battery, and secondly, for an assault and battery with an intent to murder. The court, in charging the jury, took the same distinction respecting the word intent, in the indictment, that was taken by the late mayor, in Rogers' reports, namely, that there is an actual intent and an implied one; and gave his opinion that there was no evidence of the former, and it was left for the jury to judge whether there was any of the latter; for his own part, he was inclined to think there was not. The jury returned into court after an absence of twenty minutes, and, by Mr. Eckford, their foreman, delivered the following verdict: "That the defendant is not guilty of as-sault and battery with an income to murder, but guilty of an assault and

battery of the highest nature.'
