He left London at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, & reach ed this about 12 on Wednesday. having thus performed the journey in the space of 42 hours! We un derstand he was tortunate enough to effect transfers of stock in favor of his employers before 3 o'clock, after which no transfer could be available, as the Bill introduced by Lord Castlereagh being read three times, and passed the Commons on Monday, would also pass the Lords on Tuesday, and receive the Royal Assent on Wednesday. No fewer than 38 transfers of bank stock were made in favour of foreigners on Wednesday, and about 100 since the 20th of April last; & but for the discovery of the clause in the Act before the rising of Parliament, there is little doubt that several thousand such transfers would have been made before the meeting of the new
