In August, 1815, James Riley, master of the American brig Com merce, was wrecked on the coast of Africa, and, after encountering many dangers and sufferings, he and companions were captured by the wandering Arabs, on the African desert. It is not in the power of language to describe, nor can the imagination conceive, the extent of the miseries endured by those unfortunate captives. . Worn down to the bones by the most dreadful of all sufferings, naked and slaves," they found means by the blessings of Divine Providence, to convey a letter descriptive of their condition, addressed to the consuls-or christian merchants at Mogadore. divine providence, that letter fell into the hands of Mr. William Willshire, a young Englishman, whose name ought to be known, respected, & beloved by all the civilized world. Although Mr. Riley was an entire stranger to him, Mr. Willshire seemed to be inspired by that God who had thus far guided and supported the wretched captives thro' their sufferings anally to succour and to save them. With all the zealous promptitude of a generous and benevolent heart, he dispatched a messenger into the desert; he advanced a large sum of money for their ransom, and hailed the arrival of these wretched Americans at the city of Mogadore, by hoisting the American flag to their transported sight; he received them with open arms to his bosom, as his own brethren; he u tited with them in sincere thanks to Providence for his goodness; he saved their lives, and sent them home to their country and friends, with hearts full of joy, gratitude &

From Buenos Ayres .- Oar Baltinore correspondent informs us of the arrival at that port of the schooner Plattsburgh, Capt. Partlow, in 54 days from Buenos Ayres, and communicates to us the following extract from the schooner's log. hook on her passage from Buenos Ayres to Montevideo: - On the 29th of August, at 11 A. M. saw a ship on shore at Ensenda Spit, with signals of distress flying, came to and boarded her, she proved to be the Spanish ship Trinidad, capt. Pedro Antonio Lorio, who with nine other transports sailed from Cadiz on first May with 22,000 troops for Lima, under convoy of the frigate Isabella, stopped 8 days Joseph D. Partlow afterwards received at Buenos Ayres, but that only 36 had joined the service, a serjeant had been promoted to a lieutenant, and was appointed to command them; who, it was reported, had been murdered by his own party, on his journey from Buenos Ayres to St. Jago."

Captain Partlow mentions, that affairs on the Oriental remained nearly in the same state as for the last six months. The Portuguese naval forces at Monte Video, consisted of one frigate, six sloops of war and a number of small vessels.

Extract of a letter received at Monte Video from Buenos Ayres, dated Oct. 18, 1818.

"The Director announced last night at the Theatre, that the post from Mendoza, which had been robbed on the road, brought news that Talcahuma had been evacuated by the Spaniards, and was in possession of the Patriots. This is generally believed, but wants confirmation. Capt. Sheriff, of the British trigate Andromache, writes that the vice roy of Lima had agreed with him roy of Lima had agreed with him to some arrangements for opening that port to the English, but that the merchants had resisted, and have agreed to pay 750.000 dollars quarterly; this they cannot comply with. There are letters from Lima, which speak in strong terms of the tottering power of the Spaniards. The negroes say their friend San Martin will soon be with them. Many of the rich old Spaniards are moving off. The Chili and Valparaiso squadron consist of nine vessels, go against Talcahuma, so that if the foregoing news should not he true, there is every probability of their Under the guidance of the same being able to take it, they have only one point of attention, viz. to go direct to Lima-we are all pleased with the prospect of affairs in that quarter.'
