AND BE IT ESTABLISHED AND ORDAIN-ED, BY THE AUTHORITY AFORESAID. That the following wharfages shall be collected on all vessels which may lie at any wharf belonging to the corporation of Annapolis, to wit. On all vessels at the rate of one cent per ton per day for every day they shall so remain at any of the wharves aforesaid; and all vessels lying in the second tier shall pay half wharfage, which said wharfage shall be collected daily; and the following whatfages shall be collected for the articles her the articles her the commercial bands at the states for the articles. enumerated, landed at or taken from the corporation whar: within the city, to wit: For every cord of wood 12 1-2 cents; for every thousand feet of scantling 15 cents; for every thousand feet of plank 15 cents; for every thousand feet of plank 15 cents; for every thousand staves or heading 20 cents; for every thousand shingles fo cents; for every hundred bushels of coal salt or grain 25 cents; for every hundred rails 12 1-2 cents; for every hundred rails 12 1-2 cents; for every thousand hoop poles 15 cents; for every thousand laths 6 cents; for every thousand garden pales 20 cents; for every thousand bricks 15 cents; for every thousand bricks 15 cents; for every thousand weight of fodder, hay or straw 25 cents; for every horse or black cattle 6 5 cents; for every horse or black cattle 6 1.4 cents; for every two wheel carriage 12 l₂2 cents; for every four wheel carriage or wagon 25 cents; and for all other articles not herein enumerated the wharfager is to pay, agreeable to the tonage, and it any person or persons owning any of the fore-going enumerated articles, shall suffer the same to remain on any of the public landing places longer than twenty four hours, such owner or owners shall forfeit, for every such offence double the rate of wharfage upon the said articles, for every twenty our hours the same, or any part thereof, shall so remain on the said landing places, except plank and scantling, which may so remain for four days after the landing thereof, and after that time shall be subject to double whatfage are forested and in the same for the wharfage as aforesaid; and in all cases of articles not particularly rated as aforesaid, it shall be optional in the wood-corder or inspector to receive the wharfage either on the article so taken off or landing, or on the vesarticle so taken off or landing, or on the vessel, but not both at the time, and it any person or persons shall obstruct the harbour master or wood corder, or other person appointed to collect the wharfage aloresaid, in the ascertaining the tonnage of any vessel, or in collecting the wharfages hereby imposed, he or they shall forfeit and pay 20 dollars for every offence; and the harbour master or wood-corder shall once in every month account for, on oath, and pay overto the treasurer of this corporation, all money by him received in virtue of this ordinance.

AND BE IT ESTABLISHED AND ORDAIN-ED, That it shall not be lawful for any person to heave down or clean a vessel at any publie wharf belonging to the corporation, or to land or put on shore, on any of the said wharfs, any stone, bricks, ballast, oyster shells, dirt or fitth, or make any fires there-on, without the permission of the harbour master or wood-corder, and paying wharfage master or wood-corder, and paying what rage for such vessel agreeably to tonnage, at the same rate as herein specified; and if any person shall be guilty of any of the offences aforesaid, such person shall forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars; and if any person or the sum of five dollars; and if any person or persons shall leave hogsheads, pipes or terrces, on any public wharf within this city, and shall suffer the same to remain longer than twenty four hours on said wharf, each and every person so offending shall forfeit and pay, for every hogshead line at or pipe, 6 1-4 cents, for every twenty hor hours they shall remain on the said wharf thereafter.

AND BE IT ESTABLISHED AND ORDAIN-AND BE IT ESTABLISHED AND ORDARA-ED, That if the master or shipper of any vessel or wood flat, shall refuse to haul off or remove from any public wharf, when ordered by the harbour master or wood-corder, unless the said versel or wood flat shall be loading or discharging its boad, he shall forfeit and pay one dollar for every hour he may remain thereafter.
