PIRACY AND REVOLT.

It is said that the privateer Julia
Forest with a cargo of 90 men,
shipped at Baltimore, sailed
there on a cruise last January,
commanded by one Wilson, a Scot-
man. After various adventures,
making four other captures, they
on the 10th of April, off Cape
Vincent, the Spanish brig For-
ma, bound from Havana for Cadiz,
with a Spanish colonel and family,
were spoiled of their money, to a
considerable amount, and plate. The

tain, Gaona, were taken out,
and two prize-masters and five men
on board of her, with orders to
bring her to Marguerita, for con-
demnation. The Julia Forest as-
tended to the principal prize-master,
Rhode-Island; Davies, his mate,
this city; and of the five men,
one of them is an Englishman, one
Italian, and three Americans, two
of Philadelphia; their names
James Keyser, Andrew Murray,
William Stout, James Spur, and
Thomas Broh or Purley. When ar-
rested off Marguerita, Davies, the

kept him at very hard service. We
sincerely hope it will not be long
before both Gifford and Miller will
be restored to their country & their
friends.
